Received Serious Burns

Troy the little 9 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. I. Hall was seriously burned that Friday afternoon by falling into a vat of hot water while with his grandfather, Sam Cook, who is clamming on the river just below town. The little fellow had gone to the river to spend the afternoon with his grandfather and uncle and in some way backed against the vat used to boil out the clams, falling backwards into the scalding water. His uncle, Earl Cook, who was near, heard him strike the vat, and at once grabbed him and pulled him out.

Troy in his pain jerked loose from his uncle and rushed into the river, thus cooling his clothing. His uncle and grandfather at once stripped him and greased him thoroughly with some lard they had at the tent and hurriedly brought him to his home, where Drs. Stuart and Goodale dressed the burns which extended from the middle of his back down over his hips and one arm and shoulder and one leg. The doctors at first held out little encouragement that the boy could live and his condition was quite critical until Sunday morning when he grew brighter and he has been steadily improving since.

The fact the he was in the scalding water but an instant and the cooled his clothing by plunging into the river probably prevented the burns from being deep, only the outer skin blistering and peeling off.

The little fellow has shown remarkable fortitude in bearing this suffering being cheerful and brave through it all.

This community was shocked Saturday morning to hear that Samuel cook had been found dead in his bed when his wife went to call him. He had made no complaint the night before of not feeling as well a usual, and sat up rather late visiting with his wife and some of the neighbors who had dropped in to spend the evening. Although both Mr. Cook and his wife had had the influenza last fall and neither had fully recovered from its affects, it was not thought that it had left a weak spot in his system, but it must have affected his heart. His death came as a terrible shock to his family and his friends.

Samuel Luther Cook was born in Richland Ohio, Nov, 10 1850 and died at his home in Nashua Saturday Feb. 22

1919. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Phelix [spc: Felix] Cook and came with his parents to Iowa when but a boy.

In 1873 he went to Dakota where he engaged in farming, returning to Iowa in 1881. On March 8, 1882 he was united in marriage to Miss Adilla Thompson at Plainfield Iowa. Brief Sketch of Lives of J. E. Phillips

Wife and Daughter who perished in Fire Last Week

{for the readers: Felix Cook of Bremer Co, who is also Samuel L Cook's father.}

Jacob Edward Phillips was born in Grant county Wisconsin, Dec. 21 1867, and when three years of age he went with his parents, Jacob and Myrn Phillips, to Clay County, Iowa. When but a small boy his mother passed away, and this broke up the home. Leaving him and his three sisters who found homes with relatives until they were married and made homes of their own. Mr. Phillips was married Oct.23, 1892 to Miss Georgia Smith of Horton, Iowa and they have made their home in Bremer county ever since, and most of that time was spent on a farm near Plainfield and Horton. To this union were born three daughters. The second daughter, Grace, passing away several years ago at about five years of age, and Miss Bessie M Phillips, who was staying at home helping care for her parents, perished in the flames with them, Jan. 25, 1922 . Leaving only the oldest daughter. Mrs. Nina Brown of Waverly and two grand children, two sisters, Mrs. Tillie McMemeny, ST. Paul, Minn, and Zilda Antinruth of Spokane, Wash. a niece at Long Beach, Cal and four nephews at St. Paul, Minn, who will mourn the kind and loving father, brother, and uncle.

Mr. Phillips was a member of the Modern Woodman; a good neighbor and kind friend. For several years he has been very deaf and almost blind, so his wife and daughter Bessie were his constant companions.

Georgia E Smith was born in Bremer county Iowa, Dec 20, 1863 and lived in this community until death called her on Jan 25, 1922. She was married to J. E. Phillips on Oct 23 1892 and was the mother of three children, all having passed to the Great Beyond except one. Mrs. Nina Brown of Waverly, Iowa. Mrs. Phillips parents were Mr. and Mrs. Levi Smith, pioneers of this place. When passed away several years ago, Mrs. Phillips was the only daughter, and she had an only brother Oscar Smith, who survives. Mrs. Phillips has been in very poor health for years, but was able to be about most of the time. She was a member of Royal Neighbors Camp at Plainfield and was faithful as far as she was able to attend or help the camp in any way, and she will be greatly missed by a large circle of friends and relatives.

Miss Bessie M. Phillips was born in Bremer county, Iowa, near Plainfield Oct 5 1897 and grew to womanhood here, having graduated with honors from the Plainfield high school when 18 years of age, and for tow years she was a successful teacher in Bremer county but owing to her parents' health she was forced to lay aside her own ambitions and stay with them at home, which was a great sacrifice for any ambitious young person to make. She had been faithful to her trust of the past four years, and would have been willing to sever in that capacity for several more years if the death angel had not called her on Jan. 25 1922, to answer the final summons.

Miss Phillips was a member of the Royal Neighbors Camp at Plainfield, and will be greatly missed in the camp room. Although of the modest and retiring disposition she made friends wherever she went. she leave a sister, Mrs. Nina Brown of Waverly, Iowa, and many other relatives and friends who will morn her departure and the terrible way in which this kind, loving and neighborly family met their death.

### THREE MEET DEATH IN FIRE

Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Phillips  
and Daughter Perish in  
Flames When Home Is  
Burned Tuesday Night.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Phillips and their daughter Bessie, who lived two miles east and a half mile north of Plainfield were burned to death Tuesday night when their home was consumed by fire.

The details of the tragedy will never be known as no one arrived on the scene until the home was in ruins.

About 10:30 Tuesday night someone living west of Plainfield called Fred Gallagher, manager of the Plainfield telephone company and asked him where the fire was. Mr. Gallagher then looked out and saw the direction in which it was located and began phoning the people that locality until it was learned that the fire was at the Phillips home. Mr. Gallagher and others hurried to the scene but when they arrived there the walls of the building, and one story structure, were ready to fall in and nothing could be done. The charred bodies of the three victims could be seen lying in the smoldering embers, little but the skeletons remaining.

The supposition is that the family were sleeping when the fire started from some cause and they were over come by smoke and fumes and unable to save themselves.

One daughter Mrs. Herman Brown of Waverly is left of the family. Mrs. Phillips is a sister of O. F. Smith, postmaster at Plainfield, and the family is also related to Mrs. SAM COOK and E. I. HALL family of this city.

At the time this is written 9:30, the bodies have not been removed from the ashes of the burned home, but the undertaker was expected to arrive from Waverly to care for them.
