1880 census of Prairie City, IA:

F. T. TUTTLE, age 73, Farming, born Canada, parents born Canada Nancy TUTTLE, wife, age 69, House Keeper, born VA, parents born VA

Road Poll Taxes in Jasper County, 1901-1918, part 3

(For full explanation, see August 2013 Gleaner)

During the early 1900s, Jasper County males paid road poll taxes ranging from \$2.00 to \$5.00 per person. In Des Moines Township, the residents chose to meet their tax obligations by either performing two days' labor on repairing roads or by paying the poll tax fee in cash.

The list of names below was compiled from a series of Road Poll Tax receipt books thought to be from Des Moines Township only. The list shows males with surnames from "Rose" to "Young" whose name appeared in the books, the years each satisfied his road poll tax obligation, and the manner in which he paid. Every effort has been made to copy names exactly as they appeared in the books. When a name was spelled differently in different years, both spellings are given, separated by a forward slash (/).

From Grinnell Herald, 3 Nov 1893

Oakland Acres

A town two farmers built

Locals say this town might never have been but for two ornery farmers, a lousy cattle market and a battle over a liquor license.

The story begins in the late 1950s, founder Cliff Thompson says.

"It all came into being one evening over a bridge game with my brother, Cloyd," the 83-year-old retired farmer says. "The price of cattle went kaput, way down. We were sitting there playing cards, and we said, 'Why don't we sell the cattle and build a golf course?"

Oakland Acres, about 40 miles east of Des Moines, is the smallest town on Highway 6 and the only one on the route incorporated after the interstate was built.

When a local farmer passed away in the mid-1960s, Cliff and Cloyd bought 80 acres and constructed their nine-hole golf course. Cloyd, a builder, added a few houses. More people flocked to the area after another nine holes were added in 1973. In the late '70s, the brothers decided to add a restaurant, the Oak Room.

"Jasper County wouldn't issue us a liquor license, so we decided to incorporate into a town and issue one ourselves," Thompson says.

Today, Oakland Acres is some 60 homes and 166 residents strong, but the town still lacks enough people to support small businesses. Hilltop, a nearby roadhouse, shuttered years ago. The Oak Room folded.

Yet, the unlikely town continues to thrive. Another housing development sprouted recently a mile east of the golf course.

"You know what it has turned into?" Cliff says, "A halfway point."

Couples who work in separate cities nearby – Newton, Grinnell, Marshalltown – have set down roots in the area. The golf course, meanwhile, continues to be a meeting place for friends and family in the area.

Looking back, it's a funny thing, Cliff Thompson says.

"You know, when we decided to build that course I had never played a game of golf," he says, chuckling. "We just figured it was something the area needed. As it turned out, it was."

Mrs. John Emery expects to go with them part of the way on her trip to Colorado where she will visit several months in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Docia TRIPP. Mr. Emery is planning to spend his vacation there this summer. 16 March 1910

The A.B. CREWS expect to move soon back to Richland, Iowa where Mr. Crew has recently bought a general store and will engage in the merchandise business. The Crews have been in Newton five years. Mr. Crew has been a store keeper here most of that time. That they are to move away will cause for regret to the many friends they have made while in Newton. 12 Jan 1910

Mrs. George MONLUX and daughter Miss Mae left Monday morning for their new home in one of the suburbs of Portland, Oregon. Mr. Monlux has been there for several years as the climate there is more healthful for him. Mrs. Monlux and daughter remained her waiting to sell their home on North Race Street which they sold a couple of weeks ago to Mr. J. P. BROADSTON. It will be a happy reunion when they reach Portland although they left Iowa with a little regret as this has been home for so long. 23 Mar 1910

Wheeler, at Goddard and from there to visit his own cousin Mr. Dan Couch in the same vicinity. He also visited his wife's brother, Mr. Albert TABOR near Newton. He just made a hurried visit with friends and left on Saturday for Montieth, Guthrie County where he went to see his brother Rufus Couch. He expected to return to Newton the first of this week for a more extended visit with relatives and friends.

He comes to Grinnell every other Sunday and on these Sundays will celebrate mass in Grinnell at 9 o'clock and in Newton at 11o'clock. He was in Newton last Sunday and will be here again April 24th. Father Tracy has been in Newton over four years having come here in January 1906. He came here from Australia where he had been a priest for twenty-one years. He was ordained a priest in Ireland and was appointed at once to Australia. Father Tracy was much loved by the people here and they are very sorry to have him leave. 13 April 1910


