28 July 1909

03 March 1909

17 Nov 1909**

Jones who has been in the basement of the Big Store, will go about the first of January after the busy season is over. Mr. and Mrs. Jones will probably remain in Kansas too.

Old Settlers' Banquet

A remarkably fine meeting of the Old Settlers' was held in the parlors of the Lambert House Wednesday evening. John L. Mathews, president of the association, presided. The supper was one of Mr. and Mrs. Lambert's best, which is saying a good deal, and was relished with old time vigor. The dishes were of the most modern character, and were prepared and served up in accordance with the most advanced ethics of the culinary art. Messrs. Parcells and Cushing, of California, who are guests of J. R. Mershon, began the subsequent entertainment by playing on their instruments, the violin and cornet, "I wish I was in Dixie" and "Home Sweet Home."

The reading of minutes of last year's meeting by J. C. Wilson was an interesting recitation of the preceding annual banquet's proceedings.

H. J. Skiff read an original poem, which was most seasonable for the occasion. He entitled it "A poem made to Order," and the association could not do better than to order some more stanzas of the same.

Jas. R. Mershon spoke of the old reminiscences, that were amusing and valuable; but stopped in the midst of a very interesting talk to allow the musicians to play "America," which was caught up by the audience and sung with enthusiasm.

A lady being [called] upon, Mrs. Caleb Lamb told of how the saloons were scared out many years ago, and said that they might soon again be required to be scared out. Her remarks were gladly received.

Caleb Lamb, in the course of an interesting talk said that he came to Newton, Oct. 18, 1850. He also stated that not a single death had occurred [sic] in the membership of the association during the past year.

W. R. Manning told of how the virgin prairie charmed him when he came here a boy. It looked like a limitless garden, the beautiful prairie flowers fragrant even yet in his memory.

Aaron Hammer, one of the oldest settlers, having come in 1847, was next called upon, and told of dangers from wolves and Indians in these long past days.

The musicians then played, "Marching through Georgia" and the members joined in singing the stirring melody.

Albert Lufkin read the "Death Roll" since 1885, the first meeting of the Association.

Mayor Lufkin read a poem of Sir Walter Scott's in fine style.

Mrs. John Meyer next was called upon and entertained the company with a racy talk, which she unfortunately shortened because of the lateness of the hour.

Mr. Osborne being required to speak excused himself for not giving a speech, because of the time being so limited: but promised to address the association for three hours and thirty minutes on a future occasion.

Mr[.] Ikenberry photographed the company by flash light, after which the good byes were spoken, arrangements having been made to "meet again some ither nicht, for auld lang syne[.]"~ Newton Herald, June 2, 1893

Jasper County Physicians

Newton Daily News; Saturday, April 3, 1937

First Medical Society Organized In May 1858

Dr. John Hunter Was Chairman with Son, Henry, Secretary

Editor's Notes: Following is the first of a series of articles on the history of the medical profession in Jasper county, which were recently presented by Dr. M. R. Hammer as a paper at the annual meeting of the Jasper County Medical Society.

The first medical society of Jasper county was organized in May 1858. Dr. John Hunter was elected chairman and his son, Dr. Henry Hunter, was secretary.

Doctors Harris and Gray were elected to form a constitution and by-laws, and Dr. Dinwiddle and Dr. Henry Hunter were to draw up a fee bill.

Short-Lived

This first society, which completed its organization, May 3, 1858, was short lived and Jasper county had no medical society until June 1874.

In 1874 a society was organized with Dr. J. W. Shooley, Monroe, president; Dr. J. W. Adams, Prairie City, vice president; Dr. B. M. Failor, Newton, secretary; Dr. J. R. Gorrell, Newton, treasurer, and Dr. H. E. hunter, Newton; Dr. I. A. Hammer, Colfax, and Dr. W. H. Shaw, Monroe, censors.

This society also came to an early end but was reorganized about 1879 with Dr. Henry E. Hunter as president; Dr. B. M. Failor, secretary; Dr. Perry Engle, treasurer; Dr. Marion Hammer and Dr. J. W. Shooley, members.

25 Members in 1912

In 1912, according to a report by Dr. Perry Engle, "The society is composed of 25 members, the following are officers:

"President, Dr. Harry Engle; vice president, Dr. L. E. C. Turner; secretary, Dr. F. E. Boyd; censors, Dr. Perry Engle, Dr. C. E. Boyd, Dr. John Sherburn."
