Tool's Chapel

Pioneer Jasper County Church of Tool's Chapel Honors Its Founding 85th Anniversary Is Held At Tool's Chapel Oldest Member and son of Founder, John H. Tool Is Present

TOOL'S CHAPEL – Southern Jasper county farm folks gathered beneath the sturdy oak trees that surround the venerable Tool's Chapel Methodist church Sunday to participate in the celebration of the 85th anniversary of its founding.

Happiest and yet most reverently reflective of those attending was John H. Tool, 84-year old member. For it was upon this plot of ground that 85 years ago his father James A. Tool – one of the four original pioneers who first set foot on Jasper county soil in 1843 – organized the first Tool's Chapel church. And yesterday, his son, now 84 years of age, joined in observance of the pioneer day when the church marched into the unbroken Iowa prairie side by side with the pioneer builders.

From Oldest Church

The church is an 'offshoot' of the Monroe Methodist church, which in the oldest church in the county. The Monroe church was started at Adam Tool's home in Monroe in 1844 and in 1853 James Tool held church in his home on the site now occupied by the Tool's Chapel church.

The church was located on a site about 4 ½ miles east of Monroe and along the wagon trail coming up from the southeastern part of Iowa to old Fort Des Moines where the state capitol is now located. The winding trail later became the regular highway and now as one drives east out of Monroe he winds about the wooded hills and valleys, traveling over the route of the old pioneer trail.

Sunday saw friends and neighbors gathering with members of the church for morning worship service, a basket dinner at noon in the basement beneath the towering oak trees that shroud the church in a cozy shady reverence, and participate in an informal program in the afternoon.

The Rev. W. W. Watson, pastor of the church, now a part of the Reasnor circuit charge, presided over the day's events, assisted by William McConeghey, who has served as class leader for 36 years.

The Rev. Forest Moore of Kalona, Ia., a former pastor, preached at the morning service. In the afternoon other pastors were present to bring greetings and to reminisce They included the Rev. R. E. Hodgson of Fort Des Moines and the Rev. H. U. Smith of Mitchellville. Also on the afternoon program was a solo by E. V Ethington of Bloomfield.

Informal Talks

Then members of the congregation made informal talks.

Among those present who have served the church for many years was Mrs. John Wood, herself a member for 56 years. For many years -26 she said Sunday - she taught a Sunday school class and a large number of the members were present for the event yesterday.

Then there was William McConeghey, 64 years old, and for 36 years a class leader – the lay member of the church who led in class discussions at the close of the regular services. Among the youngest members present were his three-year old twin grandchildren, Victoria and Miles McConeghey. They are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Keith McConeghey.

And of course present was Mr. Tool. He has lived on his farm a little south of Reasnor for about 63 years and has lived in the community all his 84 years. He was baptized into the church at the age of four.

"They named me John Henry Albert Tool," he related. "Guess that was enough name."

Nearly Spans Church

Mr. Tool's life nearly spans the life of the church.

In speaking with his congregation, Rev. Watson lauded the work of the pioneers and of the fine record of the church, but urged the people not to count the anniversary event a memorial only, but rather a challenge to continue further work.

The Rev. Mr. Watson also said that the congregation had hoped to erect a memorial marker at the celebration, but that arrangements hadn't been completed. He said later that he hoped to interest the Methodist churches of the county in placing a marker at Tool's Point in Monroe to mark the site of the first Methodist church in the county.

Relates history

In making preparations for the church's observance, Mrs. W. W. Watson, wife of the pastor compiled some of the early history of the church, and it is presented as follows:

In May, 1843, one could have seen two men, Adam M. Tool and William Highlands staking out the first claims in what was to become Jasper county, Iowa.

In the early summer of 1844, Mr. Tool set out to get supplies for his new house and on the trail met a stranger, riding horseback. After a friendly greeting it was revealed that the stranger was a Methodist preacher sent out to visit new settlers and look for homes where worship might be conducted. Mr. Tool invited him to use his home as one of these places. A date was set and a four weeks' service held by Rev. Johnson.

Tool's point, a tavern on the stage coach trail, became a regular preaching point on the Old Agency circuit – making the circuit seventy-five miles long in 1845.

In 1846 the work was reorganized so Tool's Point became a part of a circuit extending from Booneville, Fort Des Moines, Coon Mission and down Three Rivers territory.

Named for Tool

Tool's Chapel and Monroe Methodist church grew out of this early organization at Tool's Point. Tool's Chapel being named for James A Tool, son of Adam Tool. The patents to James Tool's land were signed by President James K. Polk June 1, 1848. [Note: See November 2014 issue for the patent.] The first services held on this land were in 1849 in a 10 x12 log cabin.

In 1853 on December 9, Tool's class was organized independent of the group now forming Monroe church. There were 10 adults with their children in the original group – James Tool, Mrs. S. Tool, Allen McDaniel, Louisa Wright (Mrs. J. H. Woody), Mrs. Elizabeth Miller, Mrs. F. Franklin, William Burns, Mrs. Amelia Burns, Mrs. Mahala Romans and Mrs. Sarah Rater.

The first church building was erected under the direction of Rev. I. O. Kemble, a young minister in 1866. It was 26 x 36 and cost \$1,425 and was dedicated in 1867 by Rev. E H. Winans.

In 1899 under Rev. D. S. Dunlavey, the church was remodeled and its present form was assumed in 1909 under the pastorate of Rev. H. C. Millice.

Mr. A. J. Couch one of the early pioneers of Jasper County came down to Newton last week for a visit with relatives and old friends. He is now living at Britton, North Dakota. He had been in Ohio for a visit with his father and mother and stopped off here last Thursday on his way. He went out to the home of his wife's cousin, Mr. O. A. Wheeler, at Goddard and from there to visit his own cousin Mr. Dan Couch in the same vicinity. He also visited his wife's brother, Mr. Albert Tabor near Newton. He just made a hurried visit with friends and left on Saturday for Montieth, Guthrie County where he went to see his brother Rufus Couch. He expected to return to Newton the first of this week for a more extended visit with relatives and friends.

Mr. Couch formerly lived in the Ira vicinity but left Newton more than twenty-five years ago. His wife was also formerly of this county and will be remembered as Miss Vina Tabor. Edith is teaching at Stillwell and her school will be out on May 28th. Mabel is teaching at Richland school in Elk Creek Township and will be out June 4th a week later. Land Patents

A **land patent** is an exclusive land grant made by a sovereign entity with respect to a particular tract of land. To make such a grant "patent", a sovereign (proprietary landowner) must document the land grant, securely sign and seal the document (patent), and openly publish the documents for the public to see. An official land patent is the highest evidence of right, title, and interest to a defined area. It is usually granted by a central, federal, or state government to an individual or to a private company.

After the American Revolution and the ratification of the Constitution of the United States, the United States Treasury Department was placed in charge of managing all public lands. In 1812, the General Land Office was created to assume that duty.¹

The first land patents in Jasper County are dated 1849. This issue lists all of the Jasper County patents for 1849. 
