Elsie Lavern Johnson, daughter of Elmer M. and Christen Christiansen Johnson, was born on a farm in Shelby County on Nov. 27, 1909. She attended grade school in Kirkman and high school in Harlan, graduating from Harlan high school in 1928. She then began nurses training at Jennie Edmundson Memorial Hospital in Co. Bluffs. After completing nurses training in 1931, she practiced as a private nurse in Harlan and worked for Dr. E. A. Moore and later Dr. A. L. Nielsen. She also served as school nurse in Harlan from 1940-1944.
