

The Life Story of -

Frithjof (Fritz) Logeland, 72

In a Lutheran parsonage at Cumberland, Wisc., Fritz Logeland was born on Aug. 20, 1902. Rev and Mrs A.J. Logeland, his parents, were native Norwegians and served churches in Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota during the growing years of their children. After graduation from high school, Fritz's occupation as a salesman brought him to Iowa where he met and married Imogene Campbell on Febr. 12, 1939. Their daughter, Linda, was born in Logan. An interest in photography led to the establishment of a studio in 1945, located at Harlan. Fritz is a past President of the Professional Photographers of Iowa, a member of the Professional Photographers of America and also Nebraska and he received a Master of Photography degree in 1972, in addition to a Fellowship in the American Society of Photographers. Always civic minded, he was an active member of the Harlan Chamber of Commerce, the Ambassadors, Lions Club, Better Business Bureau and originated the Halo Hall of Fame in the Harlan Community high school. He also served on the Harlan Community School Board. As a member of the Harlan United Methodist church, he served in many capacities including a term on the Board of Trustees. He was affiliated with the Harlan Masonic Parian Lodge No. 321, A.F. & A.M. and the Abu-Bekr Shrine Temple of Sioux City. Mr Logeland died at Myrtue Memorial hospital in Harlan on Sept 7, 1974.

Survivors include his wife, Imogene, his daughter, Linda (Mrs Gary Johnson) of Scottsdale, Ariz., and three grandchildren, Gregory, Douglas and Lisa Johnson. Also one sister, Mrs Harold (Dagny) Distel of Hutchinson, Minn., and two brothers - Thomas of Minneapolis, Minn., and Erling of Bismar, N. Dak.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday, Sept. 10, 1974 at the First United Methodist church in Harlan with Rev Larry LaVelle, Pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Harlan cemetery with Harold O. Gibson, Leland Sunderland, Elmer J. Norgaard, E.M. Christensen, Gaillard R. Heflin, and David A. Christensen serving as pallbearers.
