Carl Mark, 90

Harlan — Carl Mark, son of Peter and Elizabeth Andersen Mark, was born on a farm in Shelby county near Avoca, on Oct. 5, 1887. He attended country school and grew to adulthood on his parent's farm. For a short time he made his home in Washington state. On June 27, 1917 he married Emma Hulsebus in Harlan. Two children were born to this union. Mr and Mrs Mark made their home in Harlan. On Feb. 2, 1918, Carl entered the Army and served in France during WW I. After receiving his honorable discharge in Feb. of 1919, he returned to Harlan where he worked as a mechanic for the Hulsebus Motor Co. He worked at various other jobs including clerking for the John Frederickson Wholesale Tobacco and Candy Co. During WW II he lived in Omaha while working at the Martin Bomber Plant. In the spring of 1945, he returned to Harlan where he worked for his son-in-law, Paul Grulke, in the T. V. Repair Shop. He also worked at the Adams Hatchery and for many years was the custodian at the Shelby County State Bank.

Mr Mark died at Myrtue Memorial hospital in Harlan on Jan. 23, 1978, at age of 90 years, three months and 18 days. He was a long time member of the First United Methodist church, the World War I Veterans (Barracks 1508), and was a charter member of the Helmer Reyelt Post No. 150, American Legion which was formed in 1919. Carl was a past member of I.O.O.F. Lodge No. 267 and the Garden Club in Harlan.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by two sisters, Molly and Hilda and by two brothers, Peter and Fred. His survivors include his wife, Emma, of Harlan; daughter, Lavonne Grulke, of Harlan; a son, Richard Mark, of Clifton Park, N.
