



THE LIFE STORY OF —

Clara Rosman

Clara Catherine Rosman, daughter of John and Augusta Geiger Rosman, was born on Glendale Farm north of Harlan, on Jan. 15, 1891. She died at Myrtue Memorial Hospital in Harlan, on Nov. 21, 1976, at age 85 years, 10 months and 6 days. Clara was baptized and confirmed at St. Boniface Catholic church in Westphalia. Through the years she had been a member of St. Boniface Catholic church in Westphalia, St. Peter's Catholic church in Defiance and St. Michael's Catholic church in Harlan.

In 1920, Clara's twin brothers, Alvin and Alfred, began farming Glendale Farm. Clara, along with the twins, operated Glendale Farm all their lifetime. In Oct. of 1970 they moved to Harlan and made their home at 1407 Onyx Dr. This has been her home since that time. Clara was a member of St. Michael's Guild in Harlan and the Court St. Katherines No. 266 Catholic Daughters of America of Earling. She was also an active member of the Shelby County Garden club for many years.

In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by one sister, Leona Rosman; three brothers - Rudolph, Otto, and Alvin; one half-sister, Helen Rosman; and by one half-brother, John. She is survived by two brothers - Alfred of Harlan and Robert of Kimballton; nieces and nephews and other relatives.

A Concelebrated Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated at St. Michael's Catholic church in Harlan, on Wednesday, Nov. 24,

1976, with Rev. Richard G. Wagner as celebrant and Rev. Vince Ohlinger, Rev. Eugene Koch, Rev. Edward Kelly, Rev. Donald Bruck and Rev. Valarian Berger as concelebrants. Burial was in St. Boniface cemetery at Westphalia, with John Heller, Bob Anastasi, Steve Schomer, Bob Sonderman, John Buman II, Richard Rosman, Kenneth Jurschak, and Edward Buman, Jr, serving as pallbearers.
