Leo V. Schaben, known to all as Jack, was born July 29, 1916 in Earling, second of six sons born to Joseph and Evalyn Kearnes Schaben. He was baptized and confirmed at St. Joseph's Catholic church in Earling and graduated from St. Joseph's high school with the class of 1934. After graduation, Jack began farming northwest of Earling. On June 14, 1943 he married Lillian Kramer at St. Peter's Catholic church in Defiance. Eight children were born to this union. After their marriage, Mr and Mrs Schaben continued to farm north west of Earling. While living in the Earling vicinity, he was a member of the St. Joseph's Catholic church and the Earling Council No. 1741 Knights of Columbus. moving to Harlan, he became employed as a custodian at the Baptist Memorial Home. He has been a member of St. Michael's Catholic church since moving to Harlan. He died unexpectedly at his home in Harlan on Jan. 8, 1976. at age 59 years, 5 months and 9 days.
