The Life Story of— BERNARD N. STOLTZ, 62

Bernard Nicholas Stoltz, known to all as "Barney", was born Nov. 6, 1911 in Portsmouth. He was the son of Michael and Josephine Meier Stolz. He died at Myrtue Memorial hospital on April 22, 1974, at age 62 years, 5 months, 16 days. He grew adulthood in the Portsmouth, Westphalia, and Panama communities. On Nov. 7, 1933 he married Ann Engel at St. Joseph's church in Earling. Three daughters were born to this union: Bonnie (Mrs James Z. Burgess) of Atlanta, Ga., Shirley (Mrs Harry Nollen) and Linda (Mrs James Jacobsen), both of Harlan. After their marriage they moved to Harlan, then Defiance for a short time before returning to Harlan. This has been their home since that time. In April of 1944 he was drafted into the U.S. Navy and served overseas aboard the U.S.S. Wesson during WWII. He returned to Harlan after his discharge in Nov. of 1945. He was a member of St. Michael's church of Harlan. He was also a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 941 of Harlan.

Barney was preceded in death by his parents; three sisters - Mrs Anna Roecker, Mrs Rose Kohles and Mrs

Mathilda Carroll; and by one brother - Henry Stolz. He is survived by his wife, Ann; by his three daughters; ten grandchildren; seven sisters - Lena (Mrs William Sierk) of Phoenix, Ariz.; Mary (Mrs Albert Patten) of Des Moines; Mrs Lenora C.
