#### Will

I Joel Graves of the city of Des Moines, Polk Co and State of Iowa; being of sound mind and memory do hereby make and constitute this paper as my last will and testament hereby revoking all former wills by me made  $1^{st}-$ 

I give and bequeath to my daughter Louise Richard five dollars

To Maude Pines my granddaughter one thousand and seventy five dollars

To Sarah Emery one thousand and eighty dollars

To Jane Steel one thousand six hundred and eighty dollars

To Emily Neal one thousand two hundred and eighty dollars said sums to be set aside and paid to said persons as soon after my decease as may be convenient for my executor

 $2^{nd}$ 

I give and bequeath my household furniture and utensils to my daughters above named to be divided between them by my executer share and share alike.  $3^{rd}$ 

I give and bequeath to my sons Lewis Graves and Harvey Graves all my farming implements to be divided between them by executor, share and share alike  $4^{\text{th}}$ 

I give and bequeath all the residue of my estate both real and personal to Maud Pine, Sarrah Emery, Jane Steel, Emily Neal, Margaret Graves, Lewis Graves, Harvey Graves and Bryant Graves to be divided between them by my executor share and share alike 5<sup>th</sup>

I do hereby declare that to my knowledge there is no incumbrancer against my property or debts that can be brought against my estate of any kind or character.

In testimony I appoint as executor of this my last will and testament my son-in-law William Richards of Stuart, Iowa

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my name and signature and published this instrument consisting of three sheets of hand-written paper as my last will and testament in the presence of the witnesses named below this 31<sup>st</sup> day of December 1894.

The above instrument was at the date thereof signed by the said Joel Graves by his mark on the day and date above set forth and he at the same time declared this instrument to be his last will and testament that the same was by him signed in our presence and we each at his request signed the same as witnesses both in his presence and in the presence of each other

Joel his mark Graves

Joel Graves made a will on December 31, 1894 and appointed his son-in-law W. A. Richards to be the executor of the estate. The will was signed with his X with the witnesses being C. L. Miller and J. H. Pines. The son-in-law was married to his daughter, Louisa.

The will named the following people: Maude Pine a grand-daughter of Stewart, IA; Louisa Richards a daughter of Creston, IA; Harvey Graves a son of Des Moines, IA; Louis Graves a son of Valley Junction, IA; Jane Steele a daughter of St. Charles, IA; Emma Neal a daughter of Thayer, Union Co., IA; Margaret a daughter of Des Moines, IA; Bryant a son of Lennox, IA.

Joel's daughter, Margaret Aylesworth cared for Joel and asked for \$10.00 per week for 130 weeks and an interest rate of 6%. Richards made an order to remove Margaret from the farm and tried to settle with her without going to court. He said she should not get any pay for her father's care since she lived on the farm and got the crops and the use of the house and barn. Lewis Graves, Mamie Graves, Forey Graves, and Charlie Graves were ordered to appear to give evidence in the case between Margaret and W. A. Richards. The judge finally gave her \$5.00 a week for the care of her unsound father and ordered Richards to pay the costs.

There were several other claims that had to be settled. It also gave the description and location of the land that Joel had. It was quite a lengthy probate.

The whole will and probate consisted of about 230 pages. It appears that there was a lot of discontent between different members of the family and W. A. Richards who was the executor of the will.
