PREFACE

The object of this volume is to preserve for coming ages a complete record of Washington county's part in the greatest of all wars. The first thought is directed to those forty heroes who so willingly gave their lives to make our country a safe place in which to live. It is fitting that the book should be dedicated to their memory, and that their names and faces should appear first on the roll of honor, immediately following the gold star.

Then come the photographs and records of the other noble fellows, who were just as willing and ready to sacrifice all for their country's safety. Many of them endured untold hardships on the battle field, and were exposed to disease in the camps at home.

No honor that can be given them, will in any way equal the sacrifice they made. Their faces and war records as they appear will be looked upon and read by their children and grand children for many generations to come. The full value of the book will become more and more apparent as the years pass, and the memory of the great struggle fades away in the distance.

Interspersed at intervals throughout the book will be found interesting accounts of the various organizations within the county, which contributed so largely to the success of the war. The people at home certainly did their part and nobly backed the boys who shouldered arms. Each article has been prepared by some one vitally interested in and personally acquainted with the work and service of each respective organization.

It has been an immense task to complete this volume, greater by far than I dreamed of when I started the work. I soon found that the only way to get the photographs and records was to go after them by personal solicitation. This required me to make a personal canvass and led me into every corner of the county. I tried to get every one and very nearly succeeded. Few indeed failed to respond. I was determined that there should be no expense to any soldier. The photographs and records are as nearly uniform as it was possible to make them. Arrangements were made with Mr. Graves, the Photographer at Washington, to furnish a photograph of each soldier without cost, the photo engraving from which the prints are made will be given to everyone whose picture appears in the book.

Aside from the great amount of work, the compilation of this volume has been very interesting. All interviews with the boys and their parents have been most pleasant and I met a cordial reception everywhere. I consider it a privilege, highly prized, to have been able to meet and converse with almost one thousand Soldiers, Marines, Sailors, and Nurses.

And now I desire to thank one and all for your cooperation and encouragement. I have left no stone unturned to make the record complete. At all times the idea of permanency and accuracy has been kept in mind, with the view of making as complete a history of Washington County's part in the World War as it is possible to procure. My hope is that I have made this a work that will be prized for many generations to come.

LEON MARTIN BEATTY Washington, Iowa

Leon Martin Beatty of Washington, was born at Washington, Iowa, on December 19, 1895. He was the son of Swayne P. Beatty and Eudora B. Story.

Army Record

Private First Class Beatty entered the service April 11, 1917, at Washington, in Co. K, First Iowa Infantry. He was transferred to Co. K, 168th Infantry, 42nd Division, at Camp Mills, Long Island, N. Y. He landed overseas December 1, 1917. He was killed in action July 15, 1918, in the Champagne battle, being the first Washington county boy to make the supreme sacrifice. The Washington Post of the American Legion has been named in his honor.

JOHN TERRY MATHERS Washington, Iowa

John Terry Mathers of Washington, was born at Ainsworth, Iowa, January 11, 1897. He was the son of John C. Mathers and Lillie Cates. He was a graduate of Washington High School.

Army Record

Electrician Mathers, entered the service April 23, 1917, at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station. He was sent to the Radio School of Harvard University. After completing the course at the Radio School he was sent on board the U. S. S. Kansas, and later to the steamship Lake City as a wireless operator. On the night of October 3, 1918, the ship was struck in a collision, and sank in a few minutes. Electrician Mathers was drowned when the ship sank.

HOWARD C. KEIPER Ainsworth, Iowa

Howard C. Keiper of Ainsworth, was born at Ainsworth, Iowa, on April 4, 1896. He was the son of William H. Keiper and Frances Crawford.

Army Record


Corporal Keiper entered the service April 30, 1917, in Co. K, First Iowa Infantry. He was transferred to Co. K, 168th Infantry, 42nd Division, at Camp Mills, N. Y. He landed overseas about December 1, 1917. He was transferred to Co. H, 164th Infantry and later transferred to Co. D, 315th Infantry, 79th Division. He was in the Meuse-Argonne drive. He died April 27, 1919, of pneumonia at Rimaucourt, France.

ONA W. STEPHENS Washington, Iowa

Ona W. Stephens of Washington, was born at Clarinda, Iowa, on April 30, 1893. He was the son of John W. Stephens and Lucy Reed.

Army Record

Private Stephens entered the service April 30, 1918, at Camp Dodge. He was transferred to Camp Travis, May 23, and assigned to Bakery Co. 336. From there he was transferred to Camp Mills and embarked for overseas July 5, landing July 22. He was stationed at Nevers, France, and was transferred to Pains, September 20. He died of pneumonia February 5, 1919, at St. Jean De Mont, Vendee, France.











HARRY A. SHEETS Keota, Iowa

Harry A. Sheets of Keota, was born at Keota, Iowa, on December 28, 1894. He was the son of Henry G. Sheets and Caroline Goodman.

Army Record

Private Sheets entered the service March 12, 1918, at Fort Riley, in the Medical Officers Training Corps. He was transferred to Camp Dix and, while the company awaited orders to sail, he was assigned to special duty in a military hospital in New York. He embarked for overseas in August. He was detailed to a hospital in France giving first aid to the injured of the St. Mihiel drive. He contracted the influenza, which developed into pneumonia, resulting in his death at Froidos, France, on October 19, 1918.

CHARLES VODICKA Kalona, Iowa

Charles Vodicka of Kalona, was born in English River Township on February 3, 1897. He was the son of Frank Vodicka and Barbara Belka.

Army Record

Private Vodicka entered the service Sept. 5, 1918, at Camp Dodge. He was assigned to Co. 48, Battalion 12, 163rd Depot Brigade. He served with this unit until October, when he contracted the Spanish Influenza, which caused his death October 18, 1918. His parents came to America in March, 1869, from Radnice, Plzen County, Bohemia, on a sail ship, and settled in Richmond, Washington County, Iowa, in April, 1869. His father was 17 years of age at that time.






Army Record

Private Pauls entered the service in October, 1918, going to the S. A. T. C. at Iowa City. He became ill with the influenza which later developed into pneumonia, causing his death October 17, 1918.










George S. Wells of Kalona, was born at Kalona, Iowa, on September 29, 1890. He was the son of James Wells and Sarah Tubbs.

Army Record

Private Wells entered the service at Camp Pike, July 22, 1918. He was assigned to the 21st Company, Camp Pike Replacement Draft. He was transferred to Camp Mills and embarked for overseas September 13, 1918. He contracted the Spanish Influenza and this caused pneumonia. He died on October 1, in a hospital in France.





HENRY H. RUSSEL Washington, Iowa

Henry H. Russel of Washington, was born at Trenton, Missouri, on December 18, 1894. He was the son of Horace W. Russel and Constance Hughes. He was a graduate of Washington High School.

Army Record

Lieutenant Russel entered the service at Des Moines, Iowa, June 7, 1917. He was sent to Fort Leavenworth to take his training in the Engineers. He embarked for overseas in March, 1918. While in France he was sent to the Officers Training School at Langres, France, and won his commission there. He was assigned to Co. E, 7th Engineers. Much of his work was near the front line trenches and while leading his platoon on October 14, 1918, at the Argonne he was struck by an explosive shell and instantly killed.

PAUL M. DUNLAP

Kalona, Iowa


Paul M. Dunlap of Kalona, was born at Kalona, Iowa, October 25, 1897. He was the son of Oliver H. Dunlap and Emma Allen. He was a graduate of Kalona High School.

Army Record

In May, 1918, Paul Dunlap, with fifty-six other men from the State University of Colorado, were chosen to go the Persidio, of San Francisco, California, for special military training. He received his commission as second lieutenant in Infantry September 16, 1918, and reported for duty at the State College of New Mexico to assist in training the men at that school. He was taken ill with the influenza and sent to the base hospital at Fort Bliss, Texas, October 7. He died on October 18, 1918.








MARTIN WRIGHT Washington, Jowa

Army Record


Private Wright entered the service September 11, 1918, going to Camp Dodge where he was assigned to the 48th Co. 163rd Depot Brigade. He contracted pneumonia and died October 13, 1918. Private Wright was an orphan, coming from the Soldiers' Orphans Home at Davenport to live with the Henry Brinning family.



Charles Walton of Riverside, was born at Wellman, Iowa, November 7, 1895. He was the son of Alpheus Walton and Mary Tracy.

Army Record

Private Walton entered the service April 29, 1918, at Camp Dodge. He was assigned to Co. E, 350th Infantry. He was transferred to Camp Travis, Texas, and trained there for several months. He was taken ill with the influenza about October 1, and died October 9, 1918.







GALEN DILLY SITLER Wellman, Iowa

Galen Dilly Sitler of Wellman, was born at Daytonville, Iowa, on October 21, 1888. He was the son of D. C. Sitler and Rachel E. Shoff.

Army Record


First Sergeant Sitler entered the service January 27, 1918, at Berkeley, California, in the Naval Aviation. He was transferred to Camp Hancock, Georgia, where he was attending the Officers Training School when he contracted pneumonia of which he died November 10, 1918. He had previously served out a four year enlistment period in the Navy, from 1913 to 1917, serving on the Scout Cruiser Salem and the Battleships Virginia and Nevada.

FLOYD E. WALLACE Washington, Iowa

Floyd E. Wallace of Washington, was born in Washington County, Ia., August 16, 1895. He was the son of William K. Wallace and Sarah Ellen Hannahs. His father was a Civil War veteran.

Army Record

Private Wallace entered the service June 6. 1917, at Washington, in Company K, First Iowa Infantry. He was transferred to Company K, 168th Infantry, 42nd Division, at Camp Mills, Long Island, N. Y. He landed overseas December 2, 1917. He then went into the Lorraine Sector and from there into the Champagne Defensive. He was killed in action in the Battle of Chateau-Thierry July 27, 1918.





JESSE R. HARVEY Brighton, Iowa

Jesse R. Harvey of Brighton, was born in Washington County, Iowa, April 23, 1892. He was the son of Jesse E. Harvey and Rebecca Henry.

Army Record

Private Jesse Harvey entered the service at Camp Pike, July 22, 1918. He was assigned to Company E, First Training Regiment, 3rd Automatic Replacement Draft. He embarked for overseas September 22, 1918. He became ill with pneumonia and died October 9, 1918.



Merton Paul Topping of Wellman, was born at Wellman, Iowa, on July 27, 1894. He was the son of Albert O. Topping and Clara Schillig.

Army Record

Private Merton Topping entered the service at Camp Pike, July 22, 1918. He was assigned to Company 21, Camp Pike Automatic, August Replacement Draft. He embarked for overseas Sept. 16, and while on the way across he was taken ill with influenza and died before the boat reached Brest. He was buried in the American cemetery at Brest, France.

Army Record


Private Ledman entered the service on August 8, 1918, going to Camp McArthur, Texas, where he was assigned to the Infantry and placed in the September Infantry Automatic Replacement Draft. He landed overseas October 7, 1918, and died the next day of pneumonia which he contracted while on the boat.

Edward Claffey of Washington, was born at Minneapolis, Minn., on July 7, 1895.

Army Record

Private Claffey entered the service in June, 1917, with Co. F. First Iowa Infantry. He was transferred to Co. K, 168th Infantry, 42nd Division at Camp Mills, Long Island, N. Y. He landed overseas December 1, 1917, and went into training at Rimecourt, France, after which he went into the Lorraine Sector, the Champagne Defensive. He was killed July 27, 1918, in the battle of Chateau-Thierry. He was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. McNamara, with whom he made his home.














training at Rimecourt, France, took
part in battles on the Lorraine Sector, the Champagne Defensive and
the battle of Chauteau-Thierry. He
was wounded at Chateau-Thierry by

He landed overseas December 1, 1917, and after training at Rimecourt, France entered the Lorraine Sector, then the Champagne Defensive and last the battle of Chateau-Thierry, where he was killed in action July 27, 1918.







HENRY A. BOOTH Washington, Iowa

Henry A. Booth of Washington, was born in Osborn county, Kansas, on October 14, 1890. He was the son of Alfred Joice Booth and Mary Baker. He was a graduate of Iowa State Teachers College and Washington Academy.

Army Record

Private Booth entered the service April 30, 1918, at Camp Dodge. He was assigned to Company E, 350th Infantry. He became ill with pneumonia soon after his arrival at Camp Dodge and died May 18, 1918.

JAMES FARR Washington, Iowa

James Farr of Washington, was born in Ireland on March 24, 1893. He was the son of James Farr and Ellen Clendenning.

Army Record

Private Farr entered the service February 23, 1918, going to Camp Dodge where he was placed in the Infantry. He was transferred to the 35th Division and went overseas in April 1918. He died of wounds received September 28th, while in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive.

Army Record



He landed overseas December 1, 1917 and after training at Rimecourt, France, he went into the Lorraine Baccarat Sector, the Champagne Defensive and then into the battle of Chateau-Thierry, where he was killed in action by a high explosive shell, July 27, 1918.

Private Davison entered the service April 30, 1917, at Fairfield, Ia., in Co. M, First Iowa Infantry, from which he was transferred to Co. M, 168th Infantry, 42nd Division, at Camp Mills, Long Island, N. Y. He landed overseas December 1, 1917. After training at Rimecourt, France, he went into the Luneville Sector, the Champagne Defensive, Chateau-Thierry, the St. Mihiel Offensive and the Meuse-Argonne. He was wounded by shrapnel October 18, 1918, during the Argonne drive. He died of wounds October 20, 1918.

Army Record

Private Hawkins entered the service October 16, 1917, at Washington, Iowa. He became a member of Co. K, First Iowa Infantry and was transferred to Co. K, 133rd Infantry at Camp Cody, N. M. He went overseas with the June Replacement Draft, landing July 10, 1918. He was assigned to Co. E, 166th Infantry, 42nd Division. He was killed in action at Chateau-Thierry July 27, 1918, by a high explosive shell.

William M. Kellerhals of Washington, was born at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, on April 14, 1896. He was the son of Emil Kellerhals and Mary Schantz.


Army Record






LEON GENTRY Washington, Iowa

Army Record

Seaman Gentry entered the service at Davenport, Iowa, July 5, 1918. He was sent to the Great Lakes Naval Training Station for training. He was later transferred to the Naval Training Station at New Orleans. He was again transferred to active service at the Naval Patrol Station, Pacific Section, Balboa, Cz. He was taken ill with the Spanish Influenza in February, 1919, and died February 28, 1919.



Sylves T. Lord of Ainsworth, was born at Marston, Illinois, on September 10, 1898. He was the son of James M. Lord and Mary L. Struble. He was a graduate of the Ainsworth High School.

Army Record

Private Lord offered himself for enlistment at Washington on May 2, 1917, but was rejected because of physical disability. When the opportunity came to enter the Student Army Training Corps, he entered this branch of the service at Parsons College, at Fairfield, on October 2, 1918. There he contracted the Influenza, later developing pneumonia from which he died December 3, 1918.

CLAUDE D. SWISHER Washington, Iowa

Army Record


Sergeant Swisher entered the service June 10, 1917, at Fort Madison, Iowa, with Co. K, First Iowa Infantry. He was transferred to Co. K, 168th Infantry, 42nd Division at Camp Mills, Long Island. He landed overseas December 1, 1917, and then trained at Rimecourt, France. He went into the Lorraine Sector, Champagne Defensive, Chateau-Thierry and the St. Mihiel Offensive. He was wounded September 12, 1918, at St. Mihiel, and died September 18 of heart trouble brought on by shock and exposure.

ADOLPH BUSHEK Riverside, Iowa

Adolph Bushek of Riverside, was born at Riverside, Iowa, October 12, 1890. He was the son of Frank Bushek and Mary Kapsa.

Army Record

Private Bushek entered the service at Camp Pike, July 22, 1918. He was assigned to the 39th Casualty Company and later transferred to Company A, First Training Regiment. In September he was transferred to the 13th Company of the Replacement Draft. He embarked for overseas September 22. He contracted Spanish Infleunza on the way over, and died on October 5, 1918, before the ship reached port.











Army Record

Private Jones entered the service April 11, 1918, at Iowa City, Iowa, and was assigned to the Engineers Reserve Corps. He died of pneumonia October 21, 1918.

Army Record


Private Miller entered the service April 29, 1918, at Camp Dodge. He was detailed as a hospital orderly and worked in the hospital for several months before he contracted the Spanish Influenza which resulted in his death on October 8, 1918. At the time he became ill he was the master of ward seven of the hospital where he was detailed.

Harry Thompson of Riverside, was born at Riverside, Iowa, January 6, 1897. He was the son of Grant Thompson and Eva Younkin.

Army Record

Seaman Harry Thompson entered the service July 22, 1918 at Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He was sent to the Great Lakes Naval Training Station for training and was transferred to the Coxswains School August 16, 1918. He was taken ill with the Spanish Influenza which later developed into pneumonia causing his death September 23, 1918.




DAYLE S. REEVES Wellman, Iowa

He entered the mechanical training school at Clermont, France, and while at this work he contracted bronchial pneumonia from which he died on October 11, 1918.



Charles M. Polton of Wellman, was born at Kinross, Iowa, on July 15, 1895. He was the son of Mart V. Polton and Ellen Gillham. He was a graduate of the Wellman High School.

Army Record

Corporal Polton entered the service June 4, 1917, at Des Moines, Iowa in Co. B, First Iowa Infantry, from which he was transferred to Co. B, 168th Infantry at Camp Mills, Long Island, N. Y. He landed overseas December 1st, 1917. He was gassed in the Champagne Defensive May 27, 1918, took part in the St. gonne-Meuse Offensive, where he was killed in action Oct. 11, 1918.

Private Schantz entered the service July 22, 1918, going to Camp Pike, Arkansas, where he was assigned to the 41st Casual Company, 162nd Depot Brigade. He was transferred to Company K, 4th Training Regiment and sent to Camp Merritt, New Jersey, where he was transferred to Company 21, August Automatic Replacement Draft. This unit landed at Brest, France, September 28th, 1918. At Brest, he contracted bronchial pneumonia, from which he died October 7, 1918.

Army Record

Washington County met the financial demands of the Government during the War with the same enthusiasm and determination shown in all the other War activities. LIBERTY LOANS When the first call came in May, 1917, it found the County without any organization to sell the half-million of the First Liberty Loan apportioned; but the twenty banks of the County, under the direction and leadership of the Council of Defense, set about a new kind of task with the enthusiasm of the political fervor which enveloped the country as the Nation swept into the War; and on June 15th, the Loan closed with the County's quota over-subscribed. This good showing was due to the large subscriptions of the banks. The Second Loan came in October, with the staggering quota of over one million dollars. In their zeal for the Allied Cause many residents had put their all into the First Loan, and many others borrowed to their limit. No crop had been harvested, and little new money had come into the County; but the banks tackled the job again with the old enthusiasm. When the Loan closed at the end of the month, the County had subscribed only about two-fifths of its quota; and of this amount the banks again subscribed quite largely. The Defense Council and the banks felt that the County had been disgraced; and often afterward they were taunted with Washington County's failure in the Second Loan. If these taunts had any effect on the morale of the County, it was only to nerve everyone for the struggle. As the Third Loan approached, the need of a comprehensive County Organization to handle the Government finances became imperative. Just at this time the State Liberty Loan Organization wired Mr. Marsh W. Bailey that he was drafted as County Chairman for the Third Loan, and to report at Chicago, the headquarters of the Seventh District Reserve Banks for instructions. Upon his return, a meeting of the Bankers and Defense Council was held at the Commercial Club rooms in the County Seat; and the towns and townships organized. Immediately thereafter every School District in the County was also organized. After consultation with the local Banks and members of the Defense Council, the best man for the place in each District was recommended, and they were promptly drafted into the Organization. The Washington National Bank tendered the second floor of its office building for the use of the Committee; and County headquarters were established there. Stenographers were employed

and volunteer clerks assisted in the complete organization of the

The next move was the appointment of Valuation Committees throughout the County. These Boards consisted of the various Assessors, with others who were deemed to be the best-informed in different parts of the various Townships. These Boards met and filled out property valuation cards for each resident. Then naving tabulated the wealth of the County, it was a simple matter to apportion among its citizens the County's quota. When the Loan opened April 6, 1918, the Organization was able to suggest to each citizen his fair share of the Loan. In the City of Washington each Ward Chairman opened a headquarters where the people of that Ward came and subscribed. The plan proved so successful that the County passed its quota on the third day of the Drive. The work of taking subscriptions continued until May 4th, when the large over-subscription was considered to have wiped out the stain of the Second Loan.

English River Township, under the patriotic leadership of John A. Yoder, Township Chairman, was the first Township in the United States to obtain its quota, from which its citizens received much favorable publicity. A public celebration was held during the summer at Kalona, which was attended by the Governor of the State, a Member of the British Commission, and many others of wide reputation. The exercises lasted all day, and music was furnished by a Camp Dodge band.

The Fourth Loan opened September 28th, and closed October 19th, 1918. The same organization was drafted for this Loan. The County Headquarters were moved from the Bank building to the Washington building, adjoining Mr. Bailey's Law Office. The plan of having subscribers come to a central point and make their subscriptions had worked so well in the City of Washington in the Third Loan, that it was adopted in the Fourth Loan all over the County. This plan resulted in the Loan being over-subscribed the first day.

The Armistice was signed; and the Fifth or Victory Loan was put out on April 21, 1919 to bring the boys home. The Banks in some of the Counties of the group to which Washington belongs,

asked and were granted the privilege of underwriting the full quota of these Counties. By direction of his superior Officer, the County Chairman submitted this plan to the Banks of Washington County. The dominant portion was in favor of this plan, though a respectable minority thought it best to take the subscriptions in the old way. A compromise was effected by which all assessments were abolished and the Banks were to have all the quota not subscribed for by individuals. The term of the Chairman having expired with the end of the War, Mr. Bailey was earnestly requested to "finish the job," so that became the watch-word and practically all the Organizations stayed in for the last Loan. In other respects subscriptions were taken is in previous Loans, and the quota of the County passed before noon of the first day. As there was a substancial over-subscription by individuals, no subscriptions were awarded to Banks.

WAR SAVINGS STAMPS

In the sale of War Savings Stamps, the Government considered that every man, woman and child could and should save \$20.00 and invest the same in stamps during 1918. This seemed a very reasonable request; but the plan was not well adapted to an Agricultural people, such as inhabit Washington County. It seemed more appropriate for wage-earning localities. Consequently, after several unsuccessful efforts to effect an organization of the County, on May 1st Mr. Bailey was drafted into taking charge of this Campaign also. He immediately created a County-wide organization and conducted a drive all the year for Thrift. By a systematic campaign all the remainder of the year by public speaking and through the newspapers. aided by the tense patriotism which permeated every corner and nook of the County, the County Chairman succeeded in selling stamps to the amount of \$21.20 for every man, woman and child in the County. notwithstanding the delay in starting the campaign and the unpopularity of the securities offered. Washington was forty-fourth among the ninety-nine Counties in the sale of the W. S. S., and the only County in South-eastern Iowa to obtain its quota.

TREASURY CERTIFICATES

It was customary in other Counties to have one person as Chairman of the Liberty Loan organization, another of the W. S. S., and

still another as Director of Sales of Treasury Certificates. It was the play of fate that Mr. Bailey should hold all three of these important positions. It was the plan of the Government to ask the Banks to save up and set aside a certain per cent of their assets and purchase Treasury Certificates from time to time, to meet the U.S. Treasury's needs, which could be used to make payments on bonds. The Liberty Loan Organization or War Savings solicitors did not take money or deliver bonds and stamps; they merely took the subscriptions, which were settled at the Banks and post offices. In making settlement, the Liberty Loan buyer paid for his bonds in advance; and the Banks then ordered the bonds and used the Treasury Certificates to pay for them. In this way the Banks paved the way and made it possible for the County to buy such large amounts of bonds. The function of the Banks of the County was most important. They not only purchased sufficient Treasury Certificates to make settlement for the Bonds purchased by the individuals of the County; but at the close of the Victory Loan, after settling for an over-subscription of bonds by individuals, the Banks of the County had \$810,500.00 worth of Treasury Certificates on hand, which might have been used in the purchase of additional Victory Bonds; which shows conclusively that there were no more loyal or patriotic class of people in the County than the Bankers.

BOARD OF REVIEW

The Defense Council provided a Board of Review to pass upon all questions before the War Loan Organization, to which appeals might be taken. This Board consisted of the County Members of the Defense Council, the Chairman of the Liberty Loan Organization, the W. S. S., Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., and other War activities, together with the Township and Ward Chairman and Defense Councilmen of the Township or Ward where the particular case under investigation originated. Perhaps thirty appeals were taken from Liberty Loan workers' actions, of which not more than four were reserved, the remainder being affirmed, and in most instances the amount of the subscription was substantially increased. In this connection it is interesting to note that the War Loan Organization was not a party to bringing any Government Secret Service men into the County. It it true that a Special Government Agent did meet with the Appeal Board at the close of the Third Loan when certain Amish citizens in the Northern part of the County were under consideration; but the Liberty Loan Organization did not invite him. In all cases the War Loan Organization was fully competent and able to handle all its affairs, without the intervention of the Government Secret Service. Only three persons were excused from buying bonds, and they were found by the Board of Review to be of unsound mind. Everybody else fully met the Board's requirements.

The financial achievements of the County were recognized everywhere in the public Press and Government publications; and Mr. Bailey received telegrams and letters from the Secretary of the Treasury, Governor of the Seventh Reserve Bank, Directors and Chairmen of the various Committees under which he worked, as well as from the Governor of Iowa, Senators, Congressmen, Judges and others in authority, congratulating the County on the results attained; all of which were very much appreciated by the members of the War Loan Organization. But best of all, its people know that Washington County stood squarely behind its men in the Army and Navy; and no more cheering news was received on the battlefields of France by the men from Iowa than that their native State was the first state in the Union to subscribe its quota in the Third, Fourth and Fifth Liberty Loans, a record which will make Iowa a shinning emblem in the Sky of Democracy as long as history lasts.

The tables below show the personnel of the War Loan Organization and Banks, and the results of the various campaigns. It is reasonable to state that no County of 20,000 people in the United States presents a better record of financial achievement during the War. The results not only speak for themselves, but the end was accomplished in a dignified, patriotic and highly satisfactory manner. Truly, Washington County is one hundred per cent American.

THE RED CROSS

I. INTRODUCTION

The American Red Cross plans a permanent record of its chapter activities during the war, and, for such purpose, has requested a concise history of each Chapter. This is the response by the Washington County (Iowa) Chapter.

As the historian collects the material for this record he finds it not lacking in inspiraton and interest. The scenes of 1917 are recalled,—the awakening of the nation. America going to war was a sublime spectacle. The passage of time has given perspective in which properly to view the phenomena which we experienced two years ago when we organized for Red Cross work in this County. Conscious of it then, we now more clearly realize that the Red Cross furnished the media for expression and translation into action of the patriotism of our people. It was exactly appropriate to the needs,— it involved the service and sacrifice toward which the people turned as the common universal form of participation in the war,—it provided the organization plan of the "citizens' army" which all could join to aid in the fight for our Country's cause. It called to all that was American, and humanitarian,—it furnished the opportunity to "go with the boys over there" in spirit and in aid,—and the people of Washington County did not fail.

Let it be confessed now, however, that those who were called to the work of organization of the Chapter misjudged the force of the tide of humanitarian and patriotic impulse that was to manifest itself here. They were confident of a generous response,—they were amazed as the weeks brought a flood of enthusiasm that was beyond all measure. Few, indeed, were those who, in some way or in some degree, did not contribute to the Red Cross achievement of the County. In this thought this record will not give names except to comply with the requirements made of us, as, otherwise, the result would be a census and a directory of the County's people.

The people of America really knew little of the Red Cross in the summer of 1917, when our Country went to war. Here and there where great disasters or overwhelming calamity had brought suffering and need, its quick response to the calls for aid had been seen, but, to the people generally, and, through our great fortune and freedom from such need, our folk in Washington County in general had a very slight and indefinite conception of this organization. But we learned quickly,—the question "how can we help?" was promptly raised,—the answer found us ready. Action followed knowledge as to the required procedure, and a dozen women and a few men in Washington sent application for a Charter. This was granted and authorized the formation of a Red Cross Chapter with jurisdiction in all of Washington County. On the 18th day of May, 1917, a meeting was held at the Second United Presbyterian Church in Washington, and the formation of Chapter organization began. This was completed soon and thoroughly.

The County includes fifteen townships. Washington is near the center of the County. The north tier of three townships have, each, a good town and community center, as is also true of three of the townships on the south boundary, and a seventh township on the east boundary. A Branch was organized in each of these seven townships, each having jurisdiction in its township and substantial autonomy, and the remaining district of the County, about half, was administered with Washington as its center, and here the headquarters of the Chapter were maintained.

II. PERSONNEL AND ORGANIZATION

The following chapter officers were named at time of organization:

In May, 1917, a Board of thirty-six Directors, with members in each township, and with several ex-officio directors representing various organizations and institutions, was elected. An executive committee was appointed by the chairman, including the four officers and seven of the directors, the latter being Mrs. Eva Livingston, Mr. C. C. Cunningham, Mrs. C. J. Wilson, Mr. Jay McNamara, Dr. C. A. Boice, Mrs. J. B. Crail and Mrs. L. S. Patterson. This executive committee served until November, 1917, at which time a new committee was appointed, including the four officers then elected, and Mrs. C. J. Wilson, Mrs. L S. Patterson, Mrs. John Bryson, Mrs. J. B. Crail, Col. D. J. Palmer, Dr. C. A. Boice, and Dr. H. C. Hull.

In June, 1917, organization for production and work was completed, the "Section for Military Relief" being then composed of three committees, as follows:

Committee on Red Cross Supplies-Mrs. John Bryson, Mrs. Etha Steck. Mrs. Emma Anderson.

Committee on Warehousing and Shipping-Mr. Jay McNamara, Mr. A. E. Putnam, Mr. E. W. Corbin.

Committee on Red Cross Instruction—Dr. C. A. Boice, Miss Elisabeth Finlay, Miss Mary Hunter.

These committees, with sub-committees on instruction in making supplies, and purchasing of materials, appointed by the Committee on Supplies, organized and supervised the active production work until November, 1917.

Following the election in November, 1917, and until the activities of the Chapter in production work were closed, the "Section for Military Relief" was organized as follows:

Committee on Red Cross Instruction, two members—Dr. C. A. Boice and Miss Elisabeth Finlay.

Committee on Warehousing and Shipping, one member-Mr. S. D. Stewart.

Committee on Red Cross Supplies, six members—Mrs. J. D. McLaughlin, Chairman of Division on Surgical Supplies; Mrs. R. H. Walker, Chairman of Division on Hospital Garments; Mrs. Sadie Babcock, Chairman of Division on Knitted Articles; Mrs. C. J. Wilson, Chairman of Division on Comfort Kits and Christmas Packages; (No appointment), Chairman of Division on Refugee Supplies; Mrs. Carlton C. Wilson, Chairman of Division on Purchasing.

Division on Surgical Supplies—Mrs. J. D. McLaughlin, Chairman; Miss Elizabeth Dawson, Mrs. May McCulley.

Division on Hospital Garments—Mrs. R. H. Walker, Chairman; Mrs. St. Clair Lewis, Mrs. Chal Ford.

Division on Knitted Articles—Mrs. Sadie Babcock, Chairman; Mrs. Julia Cavender, Mrs. W. A. Gibson,

Division on Comfort Kits and Christmas Packets—Mrs. C. J. Wilson, Chairman; assistants selected by Chairman.

Division on Refugee Supplies—Not organized, but work handled by Division on Hospital Garments.

Division on Purchasing—Mrs. Carlton C. Wilson, Chairman; Mrs. J. D. McLaughlin, Mrs. R. H. Walker.

Each Branch and Auxiliary had its committees on the several lines of production work and Red Cross activity. These Branch and Auxiliary committees and those of the Chapter, listed above, formed the central organizations on which were based the complete grouping of all the Red Cross workers in the County.

It must be understood that the "committees," "sections," and "divisions" listed herein constituted the organization outline, and the divisions or committees on production in the various departments really included all the workers, whose names, because of their great number, cannot be listed here.

As a part of the Section for Military Relief, a Canteen Committee was appointed, composed of Mr. Jay McNamara, Chairman; Mr. J. R. Maxwell, Mr. Henry Steck, Mr. Wilber Miller, Mr. Sidney Smith. Assistants were selected by the committee.

The "Junior Red Cross" was organized in the fall of 1918, through the efforts and in charge of Miss Katherine Stichter, Superintendent of Schools, who directed its activities until her death in December, 1918 following which Miss Kathryn Montgomery, elected Superintendent of Schools, was appointed as head of the Junior Red Cross.

The "Section for Civilian Relief" is the part of a Red Cross organization which deals with great disasters or general calamities affecting the civil population. This Section was organized in this Chapter as the "Home Service Section," or "Home Service Department" in March, 1918, as soon as its activities in the local field became necessary and Mr. J. D. Glasgow of Washington, was appointed Chairman.

He perfected the organization, appointing Directors in each township, and sub-committees,, and has handled, personally, much of the work in this very important field of activity. In the part of this report dealing with "Work of the Chapter," mention is made of the work done by this Section.

Since production work in the chapter has ceased, the "Home Service" has been the only department in active operation, and its activities will be necessary until all Washington County men are out of the service.

The seven Branch organizations were formed in Lime Creek. English River, Iowa, Oregon, Crawford, Brighton, and Clay Townships, each bearing the name of the township in which it had jurisdiction.

III. WORK OF THE CHAPTER—METHODS AND RECORD

The first activity of the Chapter was a campaign for membership. This involved the spreading of information regarding the Red Cross. and its purpose. The newspapers of the County, all of them, gave generous space to all Red Cross copy. Every Bank in the County was a membership enrolling office. Committees were organized, and the enrollment began. At the beginning it was hoped that we could enroll several hundred members, and equal some nearby counties in that respect. The "urge" of the Red Cross call was under estimated. An enthusiast with vision proposed a thousand. 'More than that many walked into the Banks and joined in a few days. Memorial Day, Registration Day, every day, was a Red Cross Day in the organization period. The solicitors enrolled still more. Two thousand, three thousand-buttons, buttons; all clamoring for buttons. Publicity, understanding and patriotic spirit brought success. There was inspiration in that opening drive of the war,-it gave spirit and purpose and the benefits of experience to those that followed, and, just as the Red Cross was first of America's forces into the war zone, so that first Red Cross campaign in 1917, with its patriotic fervor, and its teachings of loyalty; its awakening of the war spirit, and its bringing home to our people the fact that this was OUR war, aided the final enrollment of a whole people in the forces that finally were aligned for combat. By June 30th we had over five thousand members. The figures showed that we were among the leaders of Iowa counties in membership. In November and December another campaign brought our total up to 11,249, or 56 per cent of all our people.

In June production of Red Cross supplies was taken up. Workrooms were opened in Washington and in each of the Branches.
And the women worked. From the trenches and battle fields of
France, from the stricken lines in Italy, from the first aid stations,
from the hospitals, and camps, and from all the lurking places of pain
and illness and discomfort into which our boys went to rendezvous
with suffering and death, came the reward of thankfulness for the
toil of women done for sweet mercy's sake, and came the knowledge
that their surgical supplies, and hospital garments, and knitted
articles brought aid and relief to the khaki hosts and the navy boys

who fought for the folks at home. Mere figures showing the number of articles and the dollars raised, cannot tell the story, and this historian recognizes the inadequacy of any record he might write of the sublime spirit, the unflagging devotion, the consecration, the hours of patient, careful work of the women.

The figures are a source of pride, of course,—the surgical dressings prepared and shipped by the Chapter during the war period number 166,693; the hospital garments number 4,226; the refugee garments made and shipped number 2860, and the knitted articles number 8968. Then the comfort kits and Christmas packets,—enough for our County boys, and then more sent to headquarters for other boys,—there was so much of the personal and individual gift nature in these kits and parcels that it seems out of place to record the mere number.

The division of Refugee Supplies was not organized because part of this work was being carried on in the County by other organizations, but shipments of clothing and supplies were made by the Red Cross organization whenever asked, the work being handled by special committees, and the division on Hospital Garments handled the work of production and shipment of refugee garments as above noted.

The Junior Red Cross was active in its field. The Canteen Committee functioned when the men in service were to be fed or entertained. Special committees were appointed for many special activities,—clothing collections, nut and fruit pit collections, and a number of others.

The Home Service Section was very active in its special field. It forms the recognized official connecting medium between the men in service and their families at home.

Its members here visited the soldiers' families, secured information as to the whereabouts of the men, established communication with the men through the army and navy bureaus, and handled allotment, allowance, and insurance matters for and with the enlisted men and their families, and administered relief funds where needed. During the period from its organization to June 1st, 1919, 2413 cases have been dealt with by this Section, and in 1745 of this number services were rendered, 668 involving information only.

Any report covering the work of this Section would necessarily be too extensive for this writing, and would involve giving publicity to matters which have been handled and considered as entirely confidential and inviolable. This committee will continue to function until the men of the County are no longer in service.

The Committee on Red Cross Instruction arranged for instruction in "First Aid" and two classes were conducted in Washington, with a total enrollment of ninety-five, and one class was conducted in Brighton with an enrollment of fifteen. The regular course in "First Aid" work was given, and diplomas awarded on examinations held.

The Chapter did its part in the War Fund Campaign of May, 1918. It was just organizing at time of the first War Fund Campaign in 1917, and did not enter it. The campaign in 1918 was the means of raising in the County \$22,429, when our quota was \$17,000, and it was done in practically one day, and paid in cash. Every district raised or exceeded its quota.

IV. GENERAL.

The Chapter accepted its full share of production work and of all other Red Cross activities during the war period.

The most splendid spirit of co-operation existed between the Chapter and Branch and Auxiliary organizations, and all worked together for the best total results. There was an infinity of detail involved,—the work was new, but was efficiently done. The policy was adopted of having each Branch administer the funds raised in its Township, and accounting was made by Washington headquarters with the Branches for membership and War Fund collections from residents of the township. The general chapter expenses were paid from the Washington treasury and the Branch treasuries will refund their share of same.

Throughout, the plan was followed of having every cent of a Red Cross dollar go into Red Cross production, save only the essential expense for postage, etc. Not a cent was paid to anyone in Washington County for wages, salaries, office work, or any services or work save minor expenses for cleaning and janitor work in workrooms.

In many chapters with no greater membership or volume of work office help was employed at considerable expense to handle the administration work, but in this County all such work was contributed.

A complete financial statement, showing the receipts and disbursements of each Branch treasury and of the Central treasury is submitted herewith.

In conclusion,—we're glad it's over. But, for their work and money, given to the Red Cross during the war period, comes to the people of Washington County a knowledge that, in the National crisis, when the boys were in active service, the home folks helped, a little, with the war work.


It was worth while,—the county and its people did not fail. May, 1919.

It is generally conceded that the morale of our men had a great deal to do in the winning of the war. That Washington county did her full part in sustaining that morale is evidenced by two successful drives for funds. One was conducted in behalf of the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A. in the fall of 1917 and the other for the United War Work Campaign in the fall of 1918.

Money and products of the farms were donated generously by almost 100 per cent of our citizenship. Nearly every man, woman, and child in the county seemed ready to do anything to foster and sustain every agency of helpful service for our brave boys in the army.

As previously stated, Washington County's first effort to raise money in large amounts was in the fall of 1917. A few hundred dollars was raised the year before for this army work, but there was no effort to make a thorough canvass of the county. The 1917 campaign was the first war work in which practically every person became vitally interested. The county was affiliated with the National and State organizations known as the War Work Council. Scott, Johnston, Muscatine, and Washington counties were known as the seventh district of the state. Mr. S. A. Cohagen of Davenport, who was connected with the "Y" organization of that city, came here in the interests of the state organization and as a result of his visit Dr. J. M. Wishart, Messrs. Howard Benn and J. M. Godfrey were selected on a committee to name a county chairman who at once effected a county organization.

A county convention was held in Graham Opera House and considerable enthusiasm was manifested in the drive for funds which took place November 11th to 19th, 1917. In many parts of the county the drive for funds was put on and finished in one day. Washington city conducted her drive in one day, the ward committees meeting the evening before in the Commercial Club building. At this meeting there were short "pep" talks on the part of leading citizens, and assembling at the same place next morning the teams went to work with a vim. The committees assembled again after the day's work and reported the drive a great success.

Much interest was manifested throughout the county campaign. A large imitation clock was placed in the northeast corner of central park, indicating the amounts on the dial as reported every few hours during the week of the drive. At no time did the solicitors meet rebuff and all reported it a most pleasant experience. There were many features, such as donating of loads of corn, hay, live stock, and other farm products which were sold at public auction in the streets and the proceeds donated toward the worthy cause. There were many striking examples of self sacrifice. A poor widow who afterward lost her son in battle insisted on making a donation of \$25.00. A boy in the west part of the county gave his pet pony which was sold at auction.

This drive had much to do in fostering a "get together" spirit and assisted very materially all the drives for other organizations raising war funds in the county.

The county's quota in this drive was \$7,500. The county pledges totaled \$14,608. A High School boys' organization, headed by the Community Y. M. C. A. Director, Thos. L. Hosmer, pledged \$710, making a total of \$15,318, more than doubling the original quota of the county. Practically every dollar pledged was paid in to the county treasurer and forwarded to the state treasurer.

When the county pledged and paid over fifteen thousand dollars

for Y. M. C. A. work in the army and navy it was considered a remarkable achievement. Imagine the faith and determination of the county leaders when a year later it was decided to undertake to raise over four times the above amount. Complying with President Wilson's request the county joined forces with the state and national organizations to raise \$170,500,000 for the Y. M. C. A., National Catholic War Council, War Camp Community Service, Jewish Welfare Board, Salvation Army, American Library Association, and Y. W. C. A.

The county organization of the year before was enlarged and was perfected late in October, 1918. The district officers, Mr. Ray Nymaster, president, and Mr. S. A. Cohagen, secretary, came here from Davenport and set up the organization at the Commercial Club as follows:

At the outset Washington County's quota for the seven organizations was fixed at \$46,000. Later, however, before the drive was inaugurated it was thought by the national leaders the war might last another year, or at any rate two years would lapse before demobilization were the war to end soon.

It was considered imperative, therefore, to put on a campaign in all the states for an over-subscription. Washington county joined in this general movement for an over-subscription. The state executive committee fixed 133 per cent as a goal, yet Washington county, like many other counties, aimed to exceed it. As a result a general average of 140 per cent was attained in the ninety--nine counties of the state. Washington county slightly exceeded the average county record throughout the state, pledging \$65,050.00. This does not include the amounts pledged by the boys and girls in the schools and reported elsewhere in the county history. The state organization applies the work of the boys and girls on the county's quota, though it has not been included in the above sum of \$65,050. By taking into account the boys' and girls' work, the county exceeded its original quota of \$46,000 by over twenty thousand dollars.

From the start the campaign experienced many handicaps, yet faithful work on the part of committees and general response on the part of the people brought the campaign to a successful issue. It was planned to complete the drive in one day, November 12th. The armistice was signed the day before and worked against the organization for the reason that the impression went abroad that all war work was completed when quite the contrary was the case. The epedemic of influenza put practically the entire county under quarantine, and a speaking campaign was an utter impossibility. Owing to the rigorous quarantine regulations the town and township chairmen were unable to meet indoors, so a brief open-air meeting was held in Washington to make hurried arrangements for the campaign. The assessment plan was decided upon and proved to be a wise arrangement. A quota was assigned to every ward and township based upon valua-

tion and population. Every property owner was asked to assume his proportionate share. In reality the sums subscribed had to be volunteered, and there was generous response. Muddy roads also worked a great inconvenience in the country districts of the county. The campaign, therefore, had to be prolonged for various reasons. Notwithstanding the large amount to raise and the many handicaps experienced by the organization, the campaign was a success and reflects great credit on the people of Washington county.

It was the largest amount ever raised in the county's history at one time for charitable purposes by volunteer subscription. Had the war lasted many more months the greater portion of Washington county people demonstrated that they would give their last dollar if necessary to win in the conflict against the Hun. Washington County can be justly proud of her record. Her boys in every branch of the service and the folks back home as well, did their full duty, performing tasks both pleasant and irksome, reflecting credit on all our people.

The county organization cooperated fully with the district, state and divisional organizations, being represented at meetings held in Davenport, Des Moines and Chicago. The delegates to these meetings incurred no expense to the organization. In fact, there was no personal expense charged by any person in the entire county organization. Time, money or their equivalents were generously volunteered by many in and outside the organization. The newspapers of the county, in particular, made generous donations of space to give publicity to the campaign.

When the county chairman asked for help in building up the organizations during the two years of intensely active war work, he was loyally supported. Every one called upon did his or her full part. The associations of war days in the years of 1917 and 1918 will live long in our thoughts and will be recalled with many happy memories. Special credit is due many people whose panes do not appear in this report. The faithful co-operation on the part of teams in the wards and school districts in the real work of the campaigns bespeaks the unflinching loyalty of a humble people in the time of the country's need.

Mr. A. J. Dawson had charge of county collections and did very thorough and faithful work in completing the labor of the organization.


On July 15, 1919 the county organization was disorganized. Up to and including that date the actual cash received by the county treasurer from all sources amounted to \$65,262.

To assist the registrants in filling out the voluminous questionnaires, a legal Advisory Board was appointed by the Governor. This Board consisted of Attorneys H. M. Eicher, C. J. Wilson and M. W. Bailey. They called to their assistance the other lawyers and a number of the business men of the county to the number of about fifty. A Government Appeal Agent—Attorney George Morrison—

was also appointed. These men all did their work faithfully and efficiently.

Immediately the Selective Service Board took up the work of classifying the 1673 registrants into the five classes as required by the law and in accordance with the facts as stated in the questionnaires. A total of 462 were placed in Class I. Thirty of these were married but having been married after the 18th of May, 1917, were rated as single. Classes II, III, IV and V contained the names of 1211, 841 of whom were married and 370 were single. Fifty-one of the whole number were not natives of the United States, but seven of them had been naturalized and 23 more had declared their intention to become citizens. There were five colored men.

After the questionnaires had been filled out and reviewed by the Local Selective Service Board, and appeals had been returned from the District Board, those placed in Class I were called for physical examination.

Under the first general call for troops—687,000—Washington County was asked for 216. We then had a credit of 191 due to voluntary enlistments, leaving our quota at 25. At this time Iowa as a State was credited with 49.76 per cent of its quota, while Washington County's credit was more than 84 per cent.

The first 99 men of the list were now called for examination. Seventy-eight of these were found fit for military service and placed in Class I, 18 were rejected and placed in Class V and three failed to appear. The first man under this call to be sent to camp was Emil Hesselschwardt of Kalona. He went to Camp Dodge September 9, 1917, ten more went to the same camp September 29, 1917, and the balance of the call—14—went into camp February 22, 1918.

As the various camps became organized, the calls became more frequent and a second registration day was set for June 5, 1918, for those who had attained the age of 21 since June 5, 1917. One hundred thirty-seven registered at this time and again on August 24, 1918, 21 more signed up. Only two of this total of 158 were aliens. Of the first three registrations in Iowa, 44.35 per cent were married, 90 per cent of these were given dependency claims.

A final registration day was set for September 12, 1918, to take in all those who had reached their eighteenth birthday and had not reached their forty-sixth birthday; those who had registered previously, or were in the service were not included. Two thousand two hundred sixty-five gresitered at this time and later filled out the even more voluminous questionnaires.

Of the first registration, 404 were sent to camp, all were accepted except 17. Of the registrations of June 5 and August 24, 1918, 67 were sent to camp and all were accepted.

Medical Advisory Board had been appointed to which appeals might be taken or doubtful cases might be sent. There were no appeals and the Local Board only sent seven.

A total of 4094 questionnaires were filed with the Local Board and reviewed by it. The total number of questionnaires filed in the United States was 24,234,021. Those in which a claim for exemption on account of agriculture or industry was made, of appeals taken, were sent to the District Board at Des Moines. All others were handled by the Local Board.

The Medical Examiner, Dr. C. A. Boice, assisted by Dr. G. W. Hay and Dr. E. J. Perry, who had been appointed by the Governor, examined physically 947 men for our own Board. More than 60 were examined for outside Boards. Of the 947, 769 were placed Class I, 68 were placed in C or limited service and 110 were placed in D or rejected. The rejections averaged eight and two-thirds per cent in Washington County, while in the entire State they averaged about 14 per cent. A total of 511 of these were accepted at camp. The record of rejections at camps of those sent by the Selective Service Board of Washington County was but a fraction over three per cent; for the entire State it was 5.41 per cent, and for the United States it was 8.1 per cent.

In September, 1918, a Board of Instruction was appointed with O. K. Mauck as Chairman. The purpose of this Board was to give the prospective soldier some idea of the work he would have to do, the problems he would have to face and to give him the rudiments of drill. At the first meeting, more than 220 men turned out. The outbreak of the influenza epidemic cut short the meetings and the early signing of the armistice made them unnecessary.

Washington County sent 890 of its citizens to the service, 38 of these paid the supreme sacrifice—10 were killed in battle and 28 died of pneumonia, which swept over the world in epidemic form the latter part of 1918. Eleven non-residents of the county went with our troops. Thirty-six boys were enrolled in the Students Army Training Corps. Twenty-eight men were ready to leave for camp

November 12, but the signing of the armistice the previous day kept them at home.

The county also furnished one social worker, four Y. M. C. A. men, and 16 nurses. Former residents of the county to the number of more than 70 entered the service.

The Selective Service Board put in more than 4000 hours time at the work, most of it six nights a week for a period of eighteen months. The cost of administering the Selective Service of the first registration in Iowa was twenty-six cents per man. The cost of the entire work for all four registrations in Iowa from June 5, 1917, to November 12, 1918, was \$4.05 per man accepted at camp. But one other State in the Union—Florida—had a lower per capita cost.

All records were shipped to Washington, D. C., in March, 1919. The Selective Service Board for Washington County was relieved from duty March 31, 1919.

COUNCIL OF DEFENSE

Immediately upon the entry of the United States into the World War, State and County Councils of Defense were organized throughout the nation.

The duties and powers of the several Councils of Defense were broad and not clearly defined, further than the support of the government in all its varied activities, the suppression of all forms of disloyalty, and, when called upon, the enforcement of all lawful demands of those in charge of bond and stamp sales, Red Cross work and the raising of money for the Y. M. C. A. and other kindred war work.

Col. D. J. Palmer having been appointed member of the State Council of Defense, Gov. Harding, on the 29th day of May, 1917, appointed H. M. Eicher and C. J. Wilson, members of the County Council of Defense for Washington County, and immediately thereafter, upon their recommendation, the Governor appointed, as members of the County Council of Defense from the body of the county, the following named gentlemen, towit:

Mr. Ralph Livingston rendered faithful and efficient service thruout the war as secretary. During the latter part of the service, Mr. Truxaw and Mr. Henderson, owing to the press of other business, were unable to attend the meetings at all times and on these occasions, Mr. C. C. Cummings and Mr. O. C. Dayton, respectively, acted in their behalf. A little later Mr. E. G. Gardner and W. H. Lloyd resigned because of their removal from the state and Mr. W. A. Harper

and Mr. C. C. Thomas, respectively, took their places on the council.

The brief rules under which the council worked were as follows:

"These members in each case will continue until successors are installed pursuant either to approintment by the County Chairman, or to election.

"If in any precinct more than 40 adult residents desire a change in membership, they may in writing, signed by themselves, call an election by the voters to choose a successor. The election shall be held at a convenient place in the precinct and not less than five days notice stating the time, place and purpose thereof shall be published in the newspapers of Washington, Iowa, and the newspapers if any, published in the District for which the election is held. The party so elected by majority of the votes cast, will be the succeeding member when approved by the Chairmen of the County Council of Defense and confirmed and commissioned by the Governor.

"The resident member, if any, of the State Council of Defense, the two Chairmen of the County Council of Defense, the County Chairman as to sale of Government Securities, the Chairman of the Washington Chapter of the American Red Cross, and the Chairman of the County Y. M. C. A. shall constitute a general Board to review grievances with reference to the fixing or payment of contributions in any manner relating to the war. All assessments made by the different departments shall be and remain in full force, unless raised or lowered by this Board; and the Board shall consider no grievance for excessive assessment unless presented within ten days after the department making the assessment has mailed it to the complaining party.

"The member of the Council of Defense of the precinct from which the grievance comes, shall for the determination thereof, be a member of the Board of Review." From the organization of the council, until the termination of the war, regular meetings were held at stated intervals and special sessions when required. A number of persons were cited before the member of the State Council of Defense and the chairmen of the County Council, charged with disloyalty. In these hearings the accused were given every opportunity to vindicate themselves, but in almost every instance, there was found at least a basis for the charge. And, while no drastic action was resorted to, the parties complained against were impressed with the gravity of the situation and the absolute necessity for a change of heart, at least an "about face" in their attitude.

The Board of Review was convened early in the drive, incident to the "Victory Loan," and held its hearing at the Court House upon ten successive days. Sunday excepted. Hearings were had upon all refusals to comply with the assessments made by the local salesmen, and upon all complaints made to the Board by those assessed.

It would serve no useful purpose to perpetuate an account of what transpired before the Board of Review. Sometimes the scenes were stormy, and at others, pathetic. The Board in its hearings, at times, was brought face to face with treason, but the very great majority of the difference adjusted grew out of ignorance, misapprehension and a lack of appreciation.

In each case the findings of the Board were made upon the sworn testimony of the persons appearing and in every instance the findings were complied with.

Whatever success the Council of Defense achieved in its work was due to the enthusiastic, harmonious and loyal co-operation of every member of the council, supported by the splendid fealty of the loyal men and women of the County.

In connection with the Council of Defense and working with it to accomplish a common purpose, the County Food Administration, the Legal Advisory Board and the Fuel Administration each rendered efficient service.

FOOD ADMINISTRATION

The County Food Administration was organized pursuant to plans formulated by Herbert Hoover, Federal Food Administrator, and under the direct supervision of J. F. Deems, State Food Administrator of Iowa. The County Food Administration consisted of H. M. Eicher, and C. J. Wilson, and the following named persons as Assistant Food Administrators, namely:

The duties of this branch of the service were to stimulate and encourage production and aid in the conservation of all food products; to investigate and report violations of the law and the rules of the Federal and State Food Administration, to secure and report, from time to time, data as to crop and animal resources of the County; and to supervise the hoarding, sale and consumption of sugar and bread stuffs.

This work entailed, at times, much inconvenience to the people and often resulted in positive hardship to the dealers in food stuffs, but producer and consumer, with but very few exceptions, appreciated the necessity of the restriction and acquiesced readily in their enforcement. Soon after organization a Price Interpreting Committee was appointed, consisting of C. C. Cunningham, F. L. Wilson, A. N. Alberson, Orville Elder, A. J. Yates and Rev. G. L. Eaton, J. L. Lyon, having charge of the baking division. The task performed by this committee was an important but thankless one, and as a result of the intelligent and unselfish labor performed by it, much good was accomplished.

LEGAL ADVISORY BOARD

The Legal Advisory Board was composed of C. J. Wilson, Marsh W. Bailey and H. M. Eicher, with C. A. Dewey, O. K. Mauck, E. J. Harmier, E. D. Morrison, Carlton C. Wilson, W. H. Butterfield, Geo. Ross, Geo. A. Morrison, J. M. Lytle, E. C. Eicher, S. J. Kellogg, Edwin Knupp, E. G. Gardner, D. J. Ross, W. A. Lytle, Donald Bell, C. E. Lemley, J. T. Matthews, L. H. Wallace, A. J. Dawson, J. L. Brookhart, S. W. Livingston, Theodore Michels and Guy Mannatt as associate members. The duties of this Board consisted in assisting to properly fill out the questionnaires of those who were subject to military service by the Selective Service Act of May 18, 1917, numbering in this county 4031 registrants in classes as follows:

A questionnaire consisted of sixteen pages of printed matter with five affidavits embodied therein. It contained one hundred and forty-six questions to be answered by the registrant covering family and personal history, physical fitness, religious convictions as to the war. citizenship, occupation along certain lines, financial status and minute information as to dependency, industrial and agricultural occupation.

During the sittings of the Legal Advisory Board and Board of

Review, W. A. Gibson and W. H. Warner performed the duties of Sergeants at Arms.

The time devoted by the Board to the performance of this work consumed fifty-one days. All questionnaires were not filled out by the members of the Board. Notaries and bankers throughout the county gave generously of their time to this work. The associate members of the Board rendered service to the registrants and to the Nation in the efficient labor by them performed in this important branch of home work. They were animated solely by the highest motives and the success of their endeavors is best attested by their work.

THE FUEL ADMINISTRATION

The county Fuel Administration, under the direction of Chas. Webster, state administrator, was composed of L. H. Wallace, chairman, W. A. Gibson and H. T. Reynolds, and was a very important factor in the war work of this county.

The vast quantities of coal used by the Government in the operation of the railroads and other similar utilities, the increased use of coal by the navy, coupled with the preference given factories and plants in manufacturing war material, together with the problem of transportation, became at times alarming. To prevent actual suffering it became necessary to regulate the consumption of light and fuel and this was done by the promulgation and enforcement of rules restricting all unnecessary use of fuel.

The fuel administrators of this county were tireless in their work and, thanks to their intelligent and firm grasp of the situation, any suffering incident to the fuel shortage was averted.

The Public Service Reserve, organized by the Department of Labor, had its representative in Washington, Iowa, in the person of C. J. Wilson. While in cities, manufacturing and industrial centers this branch of the home work undoubtedly performed a necessary and very valuable service to the returned soldiers, in this county it accomplished nothing, for the reason that the returned soldier had the farm, shop and former "job" awaiting him, and hence no assistance was required by him to become as useful and self-reliant a citizen as he was a good soldier.

The services rendered by the members of the Council of Defense, Food Administration, Legal Advisory Board and Fuel Administration were liberally and gladly given to the Cause without one penny of renumeration and in almost every instance at a financial loss, both in time and money.



FRENCH RELIEF WORK

The story of Washington County's work for the French women and children is one that has surprised its friends indeed, even the workers themselves. It is a story of enthusiasm, generosity, and ingenuity of which all the county may well be proud. Moreover, the figure that the work totals is itself not unflattering to a community that prides itself on doing things. Ten thousand dollars made out of odds and ends would be applauded by the thrifty French themselves. That is really the character of the Washington County French Relief Work—ingenious use of what would otherwise have been unused.

It began when Miss Jessie Jeffrey came home from St. Louis eager to send fifty garments to Mrs. Birkhead, a St. Louis woman working among the refugees in Paris. In pursuance of her plans, she talked to various groups of women—the Hospital Auxiliary, P. E. O., Sunday School Classes, Neighborhood Clubs and the Kooking Klub. At once people became interested, though the Kooking Klub members, most of them unable to give long hours at the Red Cross shop, were especially glad of an opportunity to give their time and energy to work that seemed particularly adapted to them. Later many other women in different parts of the county inaccessible to Red Cross shops were glad to join in work that could be done in odd moments in their own homes. The Kooking Klub is composed of Mrs. Helen Keck, Mrs. Mary Smith, Mrs. Maie Donahey, Mrs. Jessie Dougherty, Mrs. Cora Wilson, Mrs. Alice Livingston, and the Misses Anna Henderson, Maud Hott, Jessie and Myrta Jeffrey.

Still other groups changed the nature of their organization and turned them into all day sewing bees. The County school children, at Miss Katharine Stichter's suggestion and under the generous encouragement of their teachers, caught the enthusiasm and many are



the scrap-books, dolls, baby quilts and little garments that they made.

At first the question of money for supplies was a hard one, for some garments must be made of new cloth. In the case of the Kooking Klub, at first one after another open handed, relative or friend, provided enough material for a day's sewing—a bolt of guinea cloth for bloomers or sateen for aprons. Then visits to scrap bags and baskets became popular and yielded surprising lengths of gingham, percale, and calico left over in our lavish American way of buying. Such sources exhausted, old but good garments were ripped, washed, turned and made up. And so the summer of 1917 went—hot as it was.

At the end of August, needing money and more workers, the Kooking Klub gave an exhibition of the accumulated work. If any one had been under the impression that he was living in a middle-west town, he must have changed his mind when he entered the Scofield room next to the Democrat. There he stepped into what resembled nothing so much as an East side New York old clothes store. On the wall hung row on row of children's aprons and dresses. From lines stretched from side to side were suspended dozens of gray bloomers. After extracting a ten cent admission fee, the hostess led the visitors about displaying with the pride of creators the dresses made from Mr. Ralph Livingston's trousers, the apron devised out of three of Mr. Sam Forman's samples, the wonderful chest protectors made from that same gentleman's sample line of underwear, the mittens contrived from scraps of heavy bath robes and baby shoes of old felt table covers.

Besides, there were baby clothes made by Mrs. Dave McLaughlin's Sunday School class and tables heaped with piles of used but warm coats, overcoats, suits, skirts and undergarments. Cakes, chickens and other food and clown dolls made by Miss Flo Stewart, helped to swell the sum collected to \$70.

Part of this was used by buy underwear and hose to go with the garments and the rest to pay freight charges. The task of packing all this clothing was no small one, but Ralph Dougherty, Chas. Critz, Carl Keck, Will Wilson and Ralph Smith made such a good job of it that the boxes were commented on at the Red Cross headquarters in St. Louis as being the most professional ones they had received.

After the exhibition, the work took on new energy, more people wanted to help and more lines of activity were formed.

The papers were most generous in notices of the work and many letters and inquiries were received. We were asked to come and give a talk on the work at various places—Keota, West Chester, Letts, Wellston, Highland Center and many small groups were interested. Patterns and information were sent to dozens of others in the county—Mt. Pleasant, Brighton, Muscatine, Wapello, Haskins, Noble, Crawfordsville, Cotter, Marshalltown and Greencastle, Ind., are among the few we interested. Nearly all social clubs in town and country and Sunday School Classes took up the work. One thousand baby quilts were shipped, 125 large comforts, many coming from the Rural Schools. It was amazing how much the country children found time to do. Miss Flossie Lewis, teacher of Domestic Science in the city schools, interested her classes in the work and many, many aprons, with always a pocket and kerchief in it, were turned in to us. Many apron pockets contained a note, hair-ribbon or a little money.

We were touched to receive a number of aprons made by one who has almost lost her eyesight; another who never leaves her invalid chair sent several pairs of boys' trousers her poor pain-twisted fingers had made. Another sewed buttons to buy material for garments, as she was not blessed with much of this world's goods. Everyone seemed willing and anxious to help.

Then came a request for comfort bags for the women driven from their homes with only the clothes on their backs. Washington County women responded with 528 of them, full of things to make the most discouraged woman feel that somewhere she had a friend. Many carried friendly notes of sympathy and encouragement, messages that were deeply appreciated as later acknowledgements proved.

Again came a request for rag dolls for the little children left without playthings. Our answer again was 500. Just to keep in your minds the idea of our thrift, it should be said that the bodies were made from scraps of muslin and cotton from the Red Cross shop. Much known and much hitherto unknown talent displayed itself in painted faces. Mrs. Rose Reid deserves special mention, as she cut and stuffed 100 dolls and interested the children in her nieghborhood in dressing them. If our rag dolls were half as popular in France as they were at home, many a one has been hugged into a dirty and battered old age.

All the while, shipments of comforters, large and small, and wearing apparel were being sent almost weekly. Miss Myrta Jeffrey and Mrs. R. E. Dougherty, sometimes assisted by other members of

the Kooking Klub, attended to this. Dougherty Bros.' Clothing Store was the assemblying point, and it looked, at times, as if they would be obliged to give over their place of business to the French refugees. When little Joe Brookhart contributed a pair of rabbits to the cause, they, too, took up temporary quarters at the Clothing Emporium. Ralph evidently fed them well, for they brought a good sum and helped take care of a little French boy for part of a year.

Even the little children saved their pennies and brought them to us—others denied themselves ice cream cones—and one little girl who was having a birthday party asked her guests to bring stockings for the French children, in place of a gift for herself; another girl of twelve years spent her play time in making a very serviceable dress for a little refugee. Paper dolls were cut out by many willing little fingers from all over the state. Old friends in other states hearing of the work, wrote for Mrs. Birkhead's address and sent to her direct, so the little children who for three years had been deprived of toys might at least have a paper doll.

If you still have any doubts concerning our ingenuity, ask Mrs. Margaret Coffman about the one hundred hoods that she made from scraps, about the 50 rainbow scarfs, the yarn for which she washed, dyed and schemed to put together and the quilts she patched out of pieces too small to use for anything else. She and her helpers can tell an interesting tale. Mrs. Coffman is no longer young and her work and enthusiasm were wonderful. Thanks to her for many garments; besides all her other work, she interested her entire neighborhood.

During the summer of 1918 the need of adopting French orphans came home to us keenly. The Kooking Klub presented the matter to the community in an effective float in the 4th of July parade and the response, as usual, was generous and prompt. The float was the American mother with her well fed, well clothed children around her, surrounded by plenty of wheat and corn. At the other end, Mrs. A. B. Schmoeller in tatters with poorly clad, skinny children around her represented the French mother asking for help. Washington had to be searched to find children thin and skinny enough to be effective even with some make up. The Kooking Klub had a stand at the ball park that afternoon and cleared \$66.75. Thanks to the efficient work of husbands and interested friends.

Visiting Shriners collected enough to care for four, and individuals and groups have brought the number of adoptions up to 58. This means that the sum of \$2117 has been collected and sent for the

support of French orphans. Many have been renewed for the second year, for few have found it possible to end relations established by the sad but grateful little letters received from the children, their parents or guardians.

Little Christmas stockings were sent to us holding five dimes, the money to buy a toy, mittens, and candy for the children who thought "the Boche had killed Santa Claus." Not only children but grown ups helped fill these—some giving one dime, some five—165 stockings were filled, making \$84.50 we sent to the American Fund for the French Wounded. We have received such appreciative letters from Mrs. Birkhead who received much of our work and distributed to the refugees as they came into Paris. In no other shipments did she find such a variety or ingenuity displayed, she writes.

We have sent carpet rags given us by various groups of workers, to be made into rugs by the French women themselves. We sent a nice check to one of the camps in this country to buy supplies for the disabled boys, and received a grateful letter telling us it was used for 1000 text books they had been hoping and waiting for. We are sending a check for \$50 to buy school books for one of the newly formed schools in devastated France where the little ones have been without schools for five years. Fifty dollars will furnish books for one year.

So ends a long story. We feel, and not unjustly, that Washington County has done an astonishing amount in this work considering all the other demands upon time, strength and money. We are not vain—glorious—about it, we are only glad that we could do it, and we realize that we are perhaps quite as much benefitted as those whom we worked to help. We are much richer in spirit. Our horizons have widened and we have discovered in ourselves and others unsuspected capabilities. Certainly we have grown in that spirit of co-operation and mutual appreciation so necessary to real community living. Even those who no longer live here have felt that spirit and have sent their contributions to show that they still feel themselves one of us. We all look back upon the then busy years as a rare opportunity to serve and, quite unexpectedly, to be served. It is impossible to give the names of all who have helped. HOME SERVICE

The Home Service Section of the County Red Cross was organized in March, 1918, under the Chairmanship of J. D. Glasgow, with Headquarters in his office at the Court House. The magnitude of the work of this Department was not foreseen, and, the Organization was not attained in its full requirements, however, an Organization was effected with two Workers in each Township in the County. Handicapped at all times by lack of funds, and lack of an Executive Secretary, the field was not covered in the manner such an important work merited. Almost 5000 separate cases were handled by the Office of the Chairman, covering everything that could happen to a soldier in his connection with the Army, such as delayed letters, sickness, hospital cases, forwarding money, allotments, looking after families of soldiers, locating graves, securing all information available regarding deaths, and since the armistice more work than before has devolved on the office, and at this writing, March, 1920, the work is almost as heavy as at any time in the past, and will not be completed in another year. The after-the-war work is of vastly more importance to the Ex-service man, as it has to do with the final adjustment of his affairs with the Government, and at all times this Department stands ready to be of assistance. Probably 15,000 letters have been written, and hundreds given information through the Local Branch. Matters have been taken up through our Senators, Congressman, through regular Red Cross channels and direct with the War Department. Necessarily confidential, not much publicity has been given what was doing and has been accomplished, but the Chairman feels that the devotion of many hours each day for the welfare of the soldiers has its reward in the words of gratitude expressed so often by them, and is but an added bit to Washington County's glorious record in War Work.

Washington County's Welcome Home Day

From the day that the United States declared war on Germany, April 6, 1917 until the day that the Armistice was signed, November 11, 1918, the citizens of Washington County loyally supported their men who had left to join the colors, but as General Pershing said, "We have won a great Victory but now we face a more severe test than that of battle; if you fail, discredit will be brought upon your flag; if you succeed, no glory will be gained and no praise will be given you." He meant that peace would, in many respects, be more dangerous than war as regards the personal welfare of the soldier. Neither the soldier nor the people of Washington County failed in gaining this final victory. The returned service men were rapidly absorbed into the civilian life of the community and efforts of time and money were continued until the last man had returned home. The County Council of Defense had long considered a day to be set aside which would be a fitting tribute to the soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses for their noble sacrifices. It is a matter of mose sincere regret that Mr. H. M. Eicher, who had labored so zealously with his associates in the Council of Defense and other War activities, could not be a participant in this "Welcome Home" day, he having passed away only a few days before.

On September 11, 1919 Washington County closed its doors of business and the people thronged to Washington from every corner. Twenty thousand took advantage of the beautiful fall day and by noon practically the entire population had gathered together in the county seat. It was not only the largest but also the most sincere and patriotic crowd in our history. The expenses of the day were defrayed by the sale of buttons at one dollar each. Many, not content with buying one, bought ten or twelve. Iowa Township, including Riverside, deserves special mention for having raised their entire quota of \$250. A complete financial statement appears later in this article.

The exercises of the day began with music by Cleveland Dayton's 54th Regimental Band from Ottumwa. The Washington Concert Band was also on the program at various intervals. Undoubtedly the greatest feature of all came at 10:45 a.m., when the grand pa-

triotic pageant passed in review before Colonel Matthew R. Tinley of the 168th Infantry. A fitting float "In Memoriam" was at the head to represent the heroes who did not return. Directly following came 600 uniformed ex-service men and women; soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses, marching in a column of fours. It was a grand spectacle which thrilled the admiring populace as they never were thrilled before. Special floats representing various organizations and districts added color to the long line as did the Red Cross workers in their white uniforms. A small tank and an artillery piece from the Rock Island Arsenal attracted much attention. After passing along the principal streets, the pageant disbanded at Sunset Park. Immediately afterwards Colonel Tinley gave a stirring "American" address in Central Park.

The afternoon started off with Harry Rich in his dare devil outdoor trapeze and acrobatic performance. An exhibition of boxing was then given in Central Park by a sailor and a soldier. The great national game of baseball then took four thousand enthusiasts out to the Southeast Park where Brighton triumphed over Riverside. In the evening Harry Rich gave another hair splitting performance which made the spectators fairly gasp for breath. A dazzling display of fireworks was the fitting climax of the day's activities. Novel and unique effects were produced which were a revelation to the enormous crowd.

It was distinctly a day for the ex-service man. Medals were presented to every soldier, marine or nurse who registered at the Court House. In the most impressive and touching ceremony of the day, a special gold star medal was presented to the nearest of kin of all those who lost their lives in the service. A group picture was taken of all in uniform and these were available for sale in the afternoon. At six o'clock a sumptuous chicken dinner was served at the Methodist church without cost to all who were fortunate enough to have worn the uniform during the World War.

Despite the congestion of traffic, there were no accidents and no disorderly conduct whatever marred the day.
