MISS Edna Attleson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Attleson, succumbs to Pneumonia and Heart trouble.

Miss Edna Pearl Attleson was born in Jacksonville Township, Nov. 13, 1901, and died at her home in New Hampton, Iowa. Jan. 5, 1924. The cause of her death was pneumonia, and heart trouble.

She is survived by her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Attleson; four sisters, Ella, Ethel, Effie and Eva; one brother, Edson, all at New Hampton; one grandfather, five uncles, six aunts and other relatives, and a host of friends.

Edna has been a member of the Baptist church of New Hampton since July, 1917. Her life was always clean and upright. To her parents she was obedient and respectful at all times. She bore her burdens without any complaint. Those who knew her best testify to the consistency of her Christian life.

She was a member of the class of June 1922, of the New Hampton High School. Since her graduation from high school, she had been teaching. She taught 1 year at the Miller school in Jacksonville township. She was teaching this year at the Keisling school, four months of her term being gone which she died.

She had the best of care during her illness. A trained nurse was kept constantly in attendance upon her, but despite that earthly hands could do, death claimed her, and she has gone away for a time from those who loved her.

A short time before she died she called for her pastor, and a very few minutes following the prayer at her bedside, she passed away peaceful! like one falling asleep. Her loved ones were at her bedside when death came.

She has vanished from our sight, but not from our hearts. The mists have dimmed our vision, but the sun will yet shine, and we shall see clearly. We have said goodbye only for a time.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church, Tuesday afternoon conducted by Rev. I DJ. Bra me. The choir sang, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" and Mr. and Mrs. A. HO. Shafer sang a duet, "The Homeland."
