

# **Wishard Theatre**

The projection room was originally sheet metal on angle irons, but later was lined with cement on metal lath. The floor is cement, covered with linoleum.


Capable of projecting a twelve-foot picture at 65 feet. A lamp house containing a 400 watt mazda, which is used to project colored light through a stereopticon lens for lighting the stage. It had a double arc 35 ampere G E motor generator set.

The switchboard above the motor generator set controls the house lights, as well as the lights of the projection room. Above this is a field rheostat and a double throw switch, capable of changing the generator to A C from a power line.

A necessity was the work-bench, with drill press, tool case, vise and typewriter. Also found in the room is a film cabinet, a motor-driven rewind, constructed from Simplex magazines. It rewinds 1000 feet of film in 8 minutes and stops automatically.

A curtain hanging in front of the screen to separate the stage and audience was controlled from the projection room.



[Cont'd from page 2] STILES AND BACK . .

I used the WPA records, [available on CD for \$13] to search for "M">"Mi">Miller, I; and there is the information I need! MILLER, ISAAC 1831 TO 7-20-1908. STILES CEM. WIFE ISABEL 1835 TO 9-16-1881. The stone dates match! She, Isabel was in Stiles Cemetery in the 1940's. How did she get here since then? Well, gather the husband, WE JUST GOTTA! Load the stone, and the camera, get it down there, she has been unmarked, since I don't know when?!! And the WPA even tells us what row she should be in. Imagine the excitement of hauling a gravestone in the truck, and hoping we weren't the ones stopped and accused of grave robbing. Who would believe this?! Again, the wonders, of how, when, what happened, to have gotten her stone clear to Belknap. Why hadn't we seen it before? It was almost dark, as we arrived in the Stiles area, having been there times before, but another story, as the standing old schoolhouse is deteriorated in just a few years, due to neglect. Pulling into the cemetery and trying to figure where row 4 was, and looking for Isaac Miller. Well someone has since been buried between the fence and row 1, making row 4 of the 1940's row 5 of the 2009s. There were found Isaac AND on the same stone, Isabel. She was never unmarked! When Isaac died after Isabel, the family must have gotten them a "together" stone, and had no need for her single marking. We were more than happy to see that she was never really lost. The old stone was laid against the permanent marker for the two of them, and we felt we had done right by them. Lesson here is to incorporate the changes of life into one solid lasting memory.

I do not know if any of their descendants remain in the area, I do not know if the stone was just "landfill". I do know that it was found on this farm in 1940ish, leaning against the barn, when Roy and Marie Hunt became the landowners. For lack of any answers to them at that time, of what to do with it, they cast it aside to lay hidden for me to find! Almost 60 years later, a puzzle, a mystery, a game of chance, Who would have thought, I had gotten bit by the bug, years ago, and this is what determined how I reacted that day. Isabel and Isacc now hold a special place in my thoughts. Someday, I will determine if I know them in any other way, as they did have children and grandchildren, so the Census does say, . . . Of course not my direct line, or are they?

Like some of the other families we write about, i.e., The Smalls from the IOOF Burial, perhaps I will followup on the Millers, and include them in a future newsletter.
