Ron was committed to his faith, family, friends, church and community. Always thinking and asking the questions that others were either too afraid to ask or never thought to ask. He always rooted for the underdog. His personality granted him the ability to strike up a conversation with almost anyone, although most of the boys in Sac County that knew his daughters were afraid of him. He expected more, pushed harder, hollered when he had to and then knew when to keep his mouth shut. The true light of his life were his grandkids. He loved spending time with them taking them fishing, on motorcycle rides and teaching them to drive his Model T. He also liked to take them to the Villager for coffee and let them eat ice cream cones for breakfast and then told them that there are certain things their mother didn't need to know. Ron and Charmaine were amazing gardeners and always canned their produce, a love they passed on to their girls, their husbands and the grandkids. Ron fought a long and hard battle against cardiomyopathy and chronic heart failure. He fought to stay with his family until Sunday, March 2, 2014 at the age of 74, in Prescott, AZ, surrounded by his family, Jesus reached out his hand and Ron grabbed hold.

Ron is now at home watching over his wife of 52 years Charmaine of Sun City, AZ formerly of Sac City. His daughters and their husbands, Rachel and Kevin Freeman of Prescott Valley, AZ and Charisse and Sean McNamara of Chino Valley, AZ. His "favorite" grandsons, Ellery Freeman of Cottonwood, AZ and Logan Freeman of Globe, AZ. His "baby" grand-daughter, Ivy Freeman at home with her parents.
